

Hahn Wants County To Support 'SKAG'

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn said today he will support membership for Los Angeles County in "SCAG." Membership will be considered by the Board of Supervisors January 4 to 2 p.m. in the Hall of Administration.

SCAG is an abbreviation for Southern California Association of Governments, Hahn pointed out. It will be composed of the County Supervisors of Imperial County, Ventura, San Bernardino, Orange, Riverside, and Los Angeles, and the city councilmen of the cities in the area.

"If these elected representatives cannot work together for the good of all the people of Southern California, every section will suffer," Hahn said.

HE POINTED out Los Angeles residents visit recreational areas in other southern counties such as Big Bear, Arrowhead, Disneyland, Knotts Berry Farm, Laguna Beach, Newport Beach, and the Salton Sea. They enjoy

the beaches along the full Southern California coastline. Many Los Angeles residents have businesses or work in other counties just as citizens of other counties work or own businesses in Los Angeles County.

"Employment knows no boundaries," Hahn said, as the common problems and progress of a large area know no governmental boundaries.

HE SAID THE problems, such as rapid transit, air pollution, employment, and providing the best in recreational facilities, can be met most effectively by all elective officials of Southern California working together.

Hahn said he "has no fear of cooperation. We must trust other elected officials at every level of government (city, county, state and federal) if democracy in America is to be effective in every community."

Hahn, as chairman of the Civil Disaster Committee of the County Supervisors Association of California, has worked closely with other officials throughout the State

in meeting such disasters as the Northern California floods during Christmas, 1964.

"Mutual trust and confidence will result in good judgment and sound action for the entire State," he said.

Registrars On Duty at City Hall

Lomita residents who wish to vote in the city's municipal election April 12, 1966, have until Feb. 16 next year to register.

Three members of the staff at the Lomita City Hall, 25332 Narbonne Ave., have become deputy registrars of voters and are available during city hall hours.

Persons who have not registered since attaining the age of 21, or have changed their legal name or residence address since last registering should register.

Voters must re-register if they wish to change their political party affiliation or if they failed to vote in the general election held in November, 1964.

Discipline No Problem, Report Says

An investigation into a parent's charge of discipline problems at Arlington Elementary School has turned up no evidence of any general discipline problems. Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, told the Board of Education Monday.

Dr. Hull was ordered to investigate alleged difficulties at the Dec. 7 meeting of the board. The action was taken after W. D. Harmon complained of incidents which he said had been going on for some six years.

The report said supervision at Arlington School was the same as supervision at other district schools. Mrs. Kenneth E. Watts told Harmon she felt problems which he complained about were "specific" rather than school-wide.
