Extension Sets Class At Hospital

A repeat course in "Lip Reading for Adults" will be offered by the University of California Extension at Harbor General Hospital. The class will meet on Wednesdays, Jan. 26 through May 4, from 1 to 2:30 p.m.

Presented by Continuing Education in Health Sciences and the UCLA School of Medicine, the 15-week course will teach the hard-of-hearing to distinguish sounds and words by speech reading exercises. It will include instruction in reading and the clues involved in natural speech conversations.

FOOD, CURRENT events, and other timely topics will be used as meaningful illustrations in presenting sounds, beginning with words and progressing to phrases and sentences.

Janice R. Siegel, speech therapist and consultant, will teach the course. Class meetings will be held in the conference room of the Ear, Nose, and Throat Clinic at the hospital.

Fees for the class are \$35 per person.

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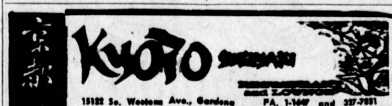
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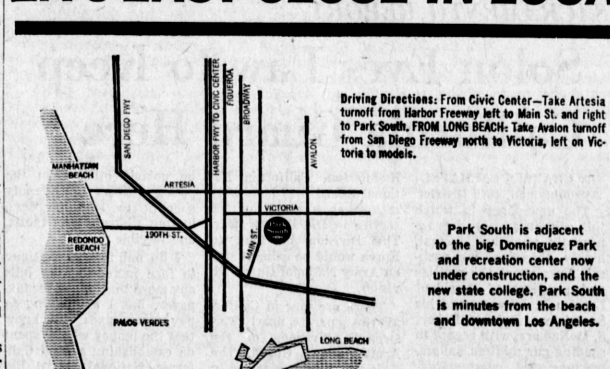
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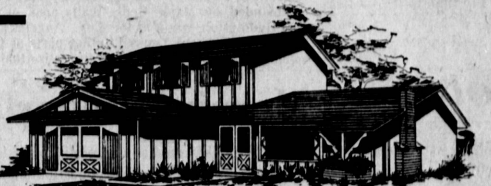
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
