

Action Delayed On New Calendar

Approval of the official school calendar for 1966-67 was withheld Monday evening pending possible revisions in the calendar.

Mrs. Kenneth E. Watts, president of the Board of Education, expressed concern about the lack of a break between the end of the regular school year and the beginning of summer school. She said approval of the calendar would mark the third year in which summer school has started immediately at the end of the regular year.

Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, will submit a revised calendar for trustees to examine at the next meeting of the board.

IN OTHER ACTION, the board:

- Tabled action on a proposal to build a new Child Care Center on the Magruder School site. The Child Care Center now is located on property adjoining Torrance High School. A new building previously has been authorized.
- Awarded a contract to Pappalardo Construction Co., Inc., calling for relocation of portable classrooms. The contract, valued at \$10,491, calls for relocation of the portable units from the Madison School to Wood School.
- Asked the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to cancel taxes on the Grace Wright Elementary School site, located between Spencer Street and Del Amo Boulevard west of Hawthorne Boulevard.
- Table a request to hire an engineering firm for work at three elementary school sites. Trustee Bert M. Lynn requested action be withheld pending further inspection and investigation of the three sites.

Work Continues On Storm Drains Preliminary Site Work Due on Two New Schools

Nearly \$5.7 million in flood control, storm drain and water conservation projects in the Fourth Supervisorial District were completed or under construction during 1965. Supervisor Chairman Burton W. Chace disclosed today.

The work represents ten storm drain contracts and seven regular control and water conservation projects which were supervised by County Flood Control District Chief Walter J. Wood.

Chace said storm drain projects completed during the year are currently serving sections of central Long Beach, the Venice area, Manhattan Beach, Rolling Hills and Santa Monica.

DRAINAGE contracts awarded during 1965 will relieve ponding problems in portions of Manhattan Beach, Palos Verdes Estates, Carson, Redondo Beach, South Gate, and Lynwood.

Funds to finance these drains were included in the \$225 million bond issue approved in 1958 and the \$275 million bond issue of November, 1964, Chace said.

FLOOD CONTROL and water conservation projects financed out of the regular District tax and completed during the year include two contracts for the West Coast Basin sea barrier project in Redondo Beach and Torrance and a right-of-way fencing contract along sections of the Los Angeles River in Long Beach, and Compton.

Contracts for three additional units of the anti-brine program along the county's west coastline were awarded during 1965.

Chace said the work is designed to protect the rapidly growing Los Angeles County area from ravages of unrestricted flood damage and to safeguard the area's ground water supplies.

Preliminary Site Work Due on Two New Schools

Contracts for preliminary site work for two elementary schools in Torrance were awarded Monday by the Board of Education.

Surface Construction Co. received the award on a combined low bid of \$118,600. Work on the sites is expected to begin next week, according to Superintendent Bernard Garen, supervisor of educational facilities.

The contracts for preliminary grading preparation for construction on the Sam Levy and Grace Wright elementary school sites.

The Sam Levy School will be built on 230th Street east of Madison Street. The new Grace Wright site is located west of Hawthorne Boulevard between Spencer Street and Del Amo Boulevard.

Plans for the two schools are being prepared in anticipation of construction early in the spring. Both schools will be ready for use in February, 1967, Dr. Garen said.
