Harbor College Names First Full Professor

Mrs. Thelma B. Taylor, li-brarian at Los Angeles Har-bor College since its opening in 1949, this week became the first faculty member to achieve the rank of full pro-fessor.

This is the top rating in a system of academic rank in-stituted in the seven Los An-geles junior colleges to rec-ognize service and achieve-ments of faculty members. Other academic ranks are as-sistant professor and associ-ate professor.

Twelve years of full-time certificated college service, plus the fulfilling of other qualifications, are required for the rank.

WHEN MRS. TAYLOR opened the college library in a small classroom, it con-tained only 180 volumes; 1,800 more were added the first year. The library now

contains some 35,000 vol-umes.

A graduate of Western Michigan University, Mrs. Taylor received her master's degree from the University of Chicago and a masters in Library Science from Colum-bia University.

Her first teaching position in California was as library supervisor for the Fullerton Elementary Schools from 1945 to 1948. She served as assistant dean of Los Angeles City College before coming to Harbor in 1949.

MRS. TAYLOR was presi-dent of California School Li-brarians in 1953-1954 and in 1965 became president of the junior college section of the Association of College and Research Librarians.

She makes her home in Palos Verdes Estates with her husband, Jean Landon Taylor, a journalism profes-sor at Compton College.

Airman 3.C. Ramon A. Guerra, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ramon A. Guerra of 2800 163rd St., Redondo Beach, has been graduated at Ama-tillo AFB, Tex., from the training course for U. S. Air Force administrative special-ists.

Airman Guerra, a 1965 graduate of Redondo Beach High School, is being reas-signed to one of the more than 250 installations world-wide where Air Force combat and support units are based.
