During intermission, Jaycettes will serve refreshments.

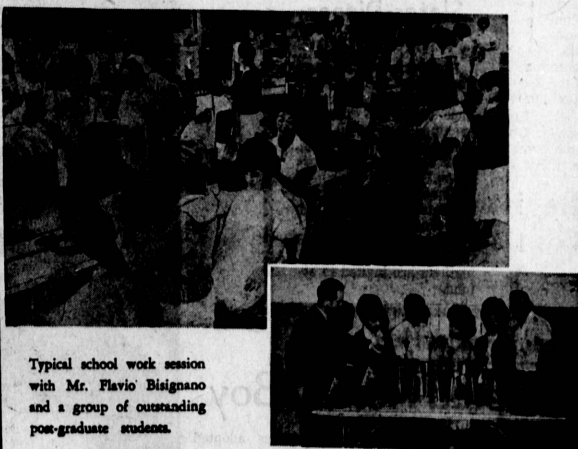
Beta Alpha Nu To Meet Jan. 26
