Continues Work for Youth

Redondo Beach Dianas Junior Woman's Club deliv-ered an array of toys to the North Redondo Toy Loan this week, announced Mrs. Peter Kiefer, Toy Loan chairman.

The Toy Loan program began in Redondo Beach, July 27, 1938, and was located in several places before the present building at Perry Park, 2310 Rockefeler Lane, Redondo. The Dianas built this building for the city in 1950 and also provide the funds to maintain it.

The Toy Loan program is under the Redondo Beach Recreation Commission authorized under the direction of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors under the Bureau of Public Assistance

borrow the toys and the sen-ior citizens who repair them that the program will now begin to receive assistance from the War on Poverty Bill.

One of the main aims of Toy Loan is character building. Children fill out an application and borrower's card, then are permitted to borrow a toy for one week. If returned on time and in satisfactory condition the child may borrow another one. After the child has 15 satisfactory marks he may borrow a wheel toy, such as a bicycle, wagon or pedal car. After 20 satisfactory returns a girl may choose a doll to keep and a boy something from the honor shelf. The doll must be brought back three times for a check up to make sure the new owner is being a good mother. The Dianas furnish all the honor toys.

This character building program helps to teach the child promptness, by bring-ing the toys back on time, honor, responsibility, clean-liness and care of public

liness and care of public property.

The toys are sanitized after every loan. Mrs. Wood-row K. Thages is the toyrarian for Redondo Beach. All toys are obtained through donations. The Toy Loan is open Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, 1-5 p.m. and Saturday morning 9:30 - 12 noon.


