The Las Vectnas club has contributed \$1000 for the purchase of a punch time-clock, other necessary items and for schol-arships.

Arships. At this workshop a monthly tuition charge is made and then the "employees" are paid an hourly wage commensurate with their ability to produce.

Industries in the area farm-out un-skilled jobs such as packaging and assem-bling. This makes for an important day for these people. The environment is kept as closely as possible to a regular work-shop. The hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. with lunch and coffee breaks.
