Board Split On Approval Of Proposals

Construction bond proposals totaling \$13.5 mil-lion — the first to be actively opposed in the com-munity — will be handed to the voters Tuesday by Torrance Unified School District.

Torrance Unified School District. The two propositions on the ballot call for a \$12.5 million issue for general school construction and another \$1 million for swimming pools at the four high schools. Two members of the Board of Education, Dr. Kurt Shery and Bert M. Lynn, have publicly opposed the measures and the Press-Herald Wednesday re-commended rejustice of the \$12.5 prepared as being

commended rejection of the \$12.5 proposal as being too high.

Two other members of the Board of Education, Mrs. Kenneth Watts, president, and William J. Han-son, vice president, have issued public pleas for approval.

In a statement to the Press-Herald vesterday Hanson said he was concerned with what he called misleading statements being made against the bond

issue. "The \$12.5 million size of the bond issue has absolutely no bearing on the amount of money that is spent each year," he said. "For years it has been necessary to spend the maximum allowed by law to keep up with the classroom needs of the new children added to our schools each year." Hanson said the need was now about \$3 million a year and that the dispute was whether a bond issue should last for three years or four. "Extra elections cost money and I begrudge the time and every extra dime that is spent," he said.
