Tighter Controls on Aid Checks Demanded

Tighter controls on the issuing of welfare checks have been demanded by Supervisor Kenneth Hahn following discovery of duplicate and counterfeit checks.

Hahn said an investigation has been launched into the issuing of duplicate checks to some welfare recipients with a possible "kickback" to a small ring of persons, possibly county employees.

Los Angeles County counterfeit welfare checks have been cashed in other parts of the state, Hahn said, involving more than \$27,000.

HE SAID there is a "strong indication" that an exact replica of the official county warrant printing plate has been made to counterfeit welfare checks.

In the case of the duplicate checks, Hahn said, the apparent method is to give certain welfare recipients two or three checks, then to intimidate the recipients into returning a part of the money to the person who is issued.

Administration in Road Department Overhauled

Sweeping changes in the administration of the County Road Department—aimed at breaking a multi-million dollar log jam in road construction—have been initiated at the request of Supervisor Kenneth Hahn.

Hahn called for the overhaul during a meeting of the Board of Supervisors last Dec. 21.

He criticized "bureaucratic red tape" for holding up already-budgeted projects designed to bring greater safety and convenience to Los Angeles County motorists.

"FOR EACH of the past two fiscal years," Hahn noted, "the Road Department has carried over from one budget to another nearly \$25 million in unexpended funds because — somehow — the projects did not get constructed."

"I called for this major study and reorganization to find the bottleneck and break it," Hahn said.

He stressed roads and highways in Los Angeles County are built from gas taxes already paid by the motorists.
