Chaperones and advisers will attend an adult workshop during the morning.

Mrs. Loring has just concluded an assignment as statewide coordinator of program for continuing education for women.

Talbert Opens Bid For Council Votes

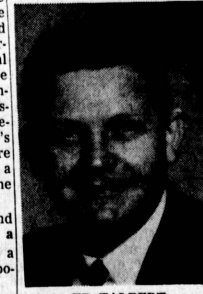
Council candidate Ed Talbert opened his campaign for the office this week drawing attention to his background and qualifications for the post.

"I believe my 20 years in banking and finance in Southern California will serve me well as a councilman," he said. "Such a background gives a man a real understanding of sound financial management; ability to cope with the problems of the individual, the small businessman, and industry; an appreciation of the other man's dollars; and a sincere desire to see those dollars put to a high and efficient use," he said.

"I HAVE the courage and intelligence to take on a problem, analyze it, reach a conclusion, and state my position," he added.

Talbert said that as property owners, he and his wife were aware of property taxes and that the man who pays the tax dollars has a right to strong representation at every level of government.

"I intend to represent him on the City Council," Talbert said.

"The rapid growth and progress of Torrance will not allow for vacillation and indecision. The administration of our city must get ahead of growth and progress, not follow it," Talbert said in his opening statement.

"THIS BRINGS US to one obvious conclusion—Torrance needs a master plan," the candidate said. "We need to plan now for the future. The look of Torrance will change considerably over the next 20 years," Talbert said, pointing out that some areas would be rebuilt and that the city must be ready to cope with high rise, townhouses, and other concepts of development.

Talbert also pointed to serious traffic problems and said they would be multiplied many times over during coming years. He calls for elimination of flooded streets and intersections, asks for seri-

ous, hard hitting attention. "They will not solve themselves," he said.

TALBERT SERVED as manager of a Torrance bank for six years and is now a vice president of Imperial Bank. He will be manager of their new Torrance office which is opening soon. He is a member of the Torrance Planning Commission and lives at 3123 Cricklewood.
