Gray First To Qualify For Ballot

Gardena attorney Dudley Gray, 43, became the first candidate to qualify for nomination in the Democratic Party primary for the 32nd senatorial district, according to Registrar of Voters Benjamin S. Hite.

Gray has opened his campaign with calls for controlling insurance companies for a reduction in the cost of a reduction in the cost automobile insurance, and for a reduction of property taxes in the state.

The householders of the State of California are paying more money in property taxes annually than all other taxes in the state," he said.

"The unequal burden borne by the property owners can and must be corrected by broadening the tax base and correcting the inequities that exist among various businesses, some of whom are completely tax free."

Gray has pledged that the first bill he will introduce, if nominated and then elected, will be to abolish topless bars.

The candidate is a past president of the Gardena Junior Chamber of Commerce and Chamber of Commerce, and the Compton Bar Association.
