Pastor Support 'Go Go' Measure

The Torrance Ministerial Association this week urged passage of a "Go Go" charter amendment which will ban topless waitresses in the city.

"The question involves no mixture of emotions, no conflict of interests, no balancing of grey values," the Rev. Francis A. Rath, pastor of Seaside Community Church and chairman of the ministerial association, said.

"It is a basic choice between what we all know to be common decency and what we know to be a breach of community standards of morality," the Rev. Mr. Rath continued.

"THE STATEMENTS were contained in an argument favoring passage of measure, which will appear on the April 12 municipal ballot as Charter Amendment C. The Ministerial Association prepared the argument for inclusion in the printed material to be mailed to voters by the office of City Clerk Vernon W. Coil. It was rejected, however, because a similar argument was submitted by Mayor Albert Isen, author of the "Go Go" measure.

Coil said the State Election Code permits only one argument to be mailed to voters with sample ballots. The code also establishes a priority for selecting the argument which must be included, Coil explained.

"IT IS permissible to use one argument only," he said, "and the law spells out the preference which the City Clerk must use in selecting the argument."

The Rev. Mr. Rath, in his argument, labeled topless waitresses as "disgusting exhibitionism" and continued, "The presence of such practices is an affront to our common sense of propriety and certainly contrary to all Judeo-Christian traditions. Such brazen dehumanization of the individual, sullies the rightful place of sex in marriage, and leads many an otherwise decent citizen down the path to vulgarity, lewdness, and low-minded fantasy."

TOPLESS waitresses "can pave the way for far worse and wide reaching immoralities which quickly corrode and decay a community's standards of decency," the Rev. Mr. Rath charged.

"The decision voters must make on this amendment is clear cut and obvious," he added, "Vote 'Yes' on Charter Amendment C."

The charter amendment is similar in wording to a city ordinance adopted last year when a bar featuring topless waitresses first opened in the Waleria area. The bar subsequently was closed.

Isen proposed the "Go Go" measure in December after the State Legislature failed to act on similar statewide proposals.
