The dome under considera-tion by the Torrance YMCA


will span 144 feet and rise to a height of 30.5 feet.

Among the locally-made products installed in the city's new YMCA are some of the plumbing fixtures — manufactured at the Torrance Plant of American-Standard, 360 Creashow Boulevard.
