Pre-School Program Set At Three Area Schools

A pre-school program for children from culturally deprived homes who will be entering kindergarten next September will be conducted this summer by the Torrance Unified School District.

Purpose of the program, according to Mrs. Gertrude Aldershof, curriculum consultant, is to give children an early start to get ready for kindergarten.

Under the federally financed Elementary and Secondary Education Act, classes will be held at Fern-Greenwood, Torrance, and Crenshaw elementary schools July 5 through Aug. 26. Sessions will take place from 8 a.m. until noon.

Parents who wish to enroll their children in the program are asked to do so at one of three schools before Friday.

PRIORITY will be given to children from non-English speaking homes. Children with serious physical handicaps will not be eligible for enrollment.

Neighborhood mothers who wish to be employed as paid community volunteers at any of the three centers are asked to contact Dr. Lloyd Reist of the personnel department of the Torrance Unified School District.

OPPORTUNITIES will be provided for youngsters to develop language skills and improve their mental and physical health. "We want to enable the culturally deprived child to begin kindergarten with the same chance to succeed as children from more fortunate backgrounds," Mrs. Aldershof said. "As a by-product, we hope to build positive attitudes towards school attendance in the formative years."

In addition to providing morning classes for students, the program will include afternoon parent education meetings. A school psychologist, social worker, physician, and nurse will work with the parents and teachers.
