### Alondra Park Pool to Get New Filters

## Senate Reapportionment Tied to Gas Tax Funds?

The 13 southern counties of California produce about two-thirds of the tax money derived from the sale of gasoline and diesel fuel, officially called highway-user taxes, but these 13 counties, including Los Angeles County, get back less than one-half of the funds collected by the State. The reason for this unfair distribution of funds is the existence in the California statutes of the "Mayo-Breed formula," named for two Northern California senators named Mayo and Breed.

The Mayo-Breed formula was part of California law long before I took my first

oath of office in 1951. During the more than 14 years that I have been in the Legislature, I have taken an active part in many efforts to change the law so that the highway-user tax funds would be distributed to all counties of California on a basis of each county receiving back from the State a sum in proportion to the amount each county contributed. Obviously, Los Angeles County would be the principal beneficiary because a very high percentage of the highway-user taxes comes from Los Angeles County.

When Frank G. Bonelli was elected to the Assembly more than 10 years ago, he soon learned that all bills introduced by Southern California assemblymen to change the Mayo-Breed formula died in the Senate.

Frank, who is now a supervisor of Los Angeles County, decided that if Southern California could not get justice by means of legislation, then the State Constitution should be amended to provide more senators for Southern California, especially Los Angeles County, which has a very high percentage of the state population. If that could be done, then we could get a fair share of the highway-user tax distribution, and receive other benefits to which we are entitled.

from San Francisco. After another re-apportionment of the State Senate, San Francisco was left with only one senator. Maloney was immediately elected to the Assembly in 1932, and was speaker-pro-tempore of the Assembly from 1943 until he retired a few years ago. When "Tommy," as his friends now call him, came to Sacramento on Monday, Jan. 4, when we opened the current session, one of the older members greeted him as "senator."

The mandates of the Supreme Court of the United States of America undoubtedly will produce more state senators from Los Angeles County and eventually we will get more of the highway-user tax money, but this is not the end, this is the beginning of a chain reaction.

A VERY intelligent gentleman, who lives in San Diego, recently told me that regardless of how or when the Senate of California is re-apportioned, this will lead soon to the re-apportionment of assembly districts, congressional districts, county supervisorial districts, and even irrigation districts.

I can give you one example to demonstrate that the gentleman from San Diego may be correct. The 46th Assembly District, which I represent, now has more registered voters in it than many state senatorial districts, many assembly districts, and a few congressional districts in California!

This is not a hint to send me to either the State Senate or the U.S. Congress. I enjoy the seat I hold in the Assembly, and I regard the climate of Washington, D.C., as poor! To paraphrase an old song: "The sea, the sea, the beautiful sea; I want to live beside the sea; the sea called Pacific, even when the Ocean is terrific!"

FRANK G. BONELLI introduced in the Assembly his proposed constitutional amendment. If it had passed through both the Assembly and the Senate, it would have been placed on the ballot for all the voters of California to consider. The State Senate, which has had most of its 40 members from Northern California for a long time, did not want to lose its northern members, naturally, hence the Senate killed Bonelli's proposed amendment to the State Constitution.

Frank was elected Supervisor of Los Angeles County. He tried to amend the State Constitution through the initiative process, but that too failed, probably because of the apathy of voters in the 13 southern counties. Supervisor Bonelli has not given up, but now the U.S. Supreme Court has ordered that the California Senate be re-apportioned on a "one-man one-vote" basis, under the very present threat that if the Legislature does not re-apportion the State Senate, a panel of three federal judges will do the job for us.

ACTUALLY, re-apportioning the State Senate is not a new thing. Years ago, the Senate was re-apportioned so that San Francisco had five senators, one of whom was Thomas A. Maloney, who served eight years as Senator.

Boy Scout To Qualify For Tour

One Boy Scout from the Los Angeles Area Council will be elected to join adult leaders in the Scouters' Good Will Tour of Japan and the Orient next summer, according to tour leader James Nakagawa.

Qualifications to compete for the scholarship tour are star, life or eagle rank, 14 years of age by May 1, 1965, high academic standing, good physical health and proven service to scouting, the community and the boy's church.

The scout or explorer chosen need not speak or understand the Japanese language and does not have to be of Japanese descent.

Applications for the scholarship are available from James Nakagawa, 707 Turner St., Los Angeles, 12. A volunteer committee headed by Sam Ejima, Pueblo District commissioner, will review applications and interview each boy individually. The winner will be announced in May.
