### Retirement Benefits Improved

Substantial improvements in Union Carbide Corp.'s retirement program have been announced for unorganized hourly and salaried employees, subject to approval by stockholders at their April meeting and the Internal Revenue Service.

The changes will liberalize the company's retirement program by making possible retirement as early as age 55 and providing full retirement benefits for employees age 62 with 10 years service.

Employees who wish to re-

tire at 55 must have 10 years service and pensions will be actuarially reduced. Any employee who is 40 and is laid off with 10 years of service credited would be entitled to a vested pension benefit with full credit for all his company service.

Life insurance coverage for early retirees has been improved and employees with 15 or more years of service may continue full life insurance to age 65 if he has participated in the program for five full years.

### New Street In Carson

Plans and specifications for the construction of a street to provide access to eight homesites in the Carson area have been approved by the County Road Department.

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn said the new street will provide the necessary access to homesites in a tract near 223rd Street and Normandie Avenue.

## Extension Sets New Courses

Eleven new courses will be among the total of 94 presented in the Torrance area by University of California Extension this spring, according to Dr. Richard D. Guengrich, principal of North High School and University Extension area representative.

The new courses include: Contemporary Art; Oral Communication for Business Management; Cost Effectiveness and Control; The Etiology, Characteristics and Social Control of the Mental Deficient; Education Guidance of Learning Children; Diagnosis and Remediation in Secondary Schools; Backgrounds of African Culture for Teachers in Elementary and Secondary Schools; Culture and Personality; Values of Contemporary Man; and Guitar for Classroom Teachers.

These and 83 other courses and special programs in the fields of education, business administration, real estate, engineering, art, history, mathematics, philosophy, physical education, psychology, sociology, and Spanish are scheduled to open the week of February 8.

REGISTRATIONS for classes in Torrance, Inglewood, Manhattan Beach, Long Beach, San Pedro, Palms Verdes, Compton, Rolling Hills, Lawndale, El Segundo and Hawthorne are now being taken at the South Bay area Extension headquarters, 3613 W. 182nd St. The telephone number is DAvis 3-4773.

Special programs include: The Values of Contemporary Man, a lecture series exploring influences affecting the complex area of American values, beginning Feb. 18 in Torrance; Special Approaches to Reading - Elementary Schools, a 15-week lecture series beginning Feb. 4 in Torrance; Small Business Management, an eight-week lecture series scheduled to start Feb. 11 in Hawthorne; Sensitivity Training, intent on promoting more effective leadership, starting with a five-in weekend March 5-7 at the University Residential Conference Center; and lecture-discussion programs to be held in private homes in Hermosa Beach, Palms Verdes and Manhattan Beach.

### Mme. Nhu's Father at HC

An analysis of the current situation in South Viet Nam will be given by Dr. Tran Van Chuong, father of Mme. Nhu, in the next Harbor Forum lecture at Harbor College, Thursday, at 8 p.m., in the Seahawk Center.

Dr. Chuong resigned in 1963 after serving nine years as South Viet Nam's first ambassador to the United States in protest against the policies of the former Diem regime.
