Plan Expand Statewide Education Test Program

The statewide testing program established by the State Legislature in 1961 has "demolished the myth" of sub-standard education in California.

But the State Board of Education's testing advisory committee believes the program can do much more than that.

Alden W. Badal of the Oakland City Schools and chairman of the committee, told Board members at their January meeting in Los Angeles that much has been learned

through the testing program in its three years and recommended that it be continued.

One of the lessons of the program is that California students are performing better in most subject matter areas than the national average.

However, Dr. Badal emphasized that a clearer picture of goals could bring greater utilization of the tests.

And his committee lined up firmly behind the use of multiple rather than single tests. Dr. Badal said districts should be free to choose from a number of tests so they could be used for different purposes. Dr. Max Rafferty, state superintendent of public instruction, has been urging that a single test be used by all districts in the state.

The committee also recommended that test data be used for research studies and financing be provided for this.

Board members took the recommendations under advisement and they also suggested several ways in which the program could now be directed—including testing for curriculum changes—as a research tool, to guide in the improvement of instruction and as the basis for developing more accurate achievement tests for minority children.

Banning Adult School announces the Spring Schedule of the class in Seamanship and Boating Safety, taught by Captain Donald Brandmeyer. Captain Brandmeyer's classes are always profitable, practical, and interesting. The class starts on Monday evening, February 1, and will meet each Monday evening from 6:30 to 9:30.

Captain Brandmeyer has served a Master of several large ships, and has been a Marine Surveyor for 14 years. He has completed three years of International and Admiralty Law. He is certified as Inspector-Examiner and Instructor by the United States Coast Guard. He states that most marine underwriters will grant a ten per cent discount on boat insurance policies to persons who have completed a recognized course in Marine Navigation and Seamanship.
