Modern Navy Nuclear Programs Offered

"Underway on nuclear power."

That message, relayed from the USS Nautilus on Jan. 17, 1955, signaled the beginning of a new era for the U. S. Navy. The Nautilus was the first of the Navy's nuclear-powered submarines, built to last—10 years after the first message—she has been joined by 50 other nuclear-powered submarines.

Also in the fleet are three surface nuclear-powered ships, including the USS Enterprise, the largest and fastest warship in the world. A fourth, the guided missile frigate Truxton, has not been commissioned, and eight additional nuclear submarines are awaiting commissions.

CONGRESS HAS authorized 27 additional nuclear submarines, many of which are now under construction.

The world's first nuclear task force, which includes the Enterprise, the guided missile cruiser Long Beach, and the guided missile frigate Bainbridge, have just recently completed an around-the-world voyage without refueling. The 30,000-mile trip was completed in record time.

U. S. nuclear submarines have set records in submersible operations, including a 36,000-mile submerged circumnavigation of the world completed by the Triton in 1960. The Nautilus was the first ship to reach the Geographic North Pole and also set an early record for prolonged travel under water.

THE NAVY also has harnessed nuclear power for purposes other than driving ships. At McMurdo Sound in the Antarctic, a nuclear reactor provides the heat and electricity for men engaged in Operation Deep Freeze. The reactor also is used for the desalination of water.

New Navy programs for young men were developed with the increasing use of nuclear power. Currently, recruiters are looking for men who want to join the Navy in a nuclear field.

Five rates are offered in nuclear power, according to Chief Vandorne E. Isaak, the local Navy recruiter. Chief Isaak will discuss the nuclear program with prospective enlistees at his office, 1320 Cravens Ave., or by telephone at FA 0-3141.

Other letters urged Bell to:

- Support the Belgian-American rescue mission to the Congo.
- Praise achievements of J. Edgar Hoover, director of the FBI.
- Express concern about the future of the minority party.

- Urge retention of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.
- Recommend the streamlining procedural rules in Congress.
- Oppose Supreme Court decision requiring state reapportionment.
- Protest the sale of holiday postage stamps without a religious theme.
- Urge abolition of the House Un-American Activities.
- Protest the merging of reserve units and the National Guard.

It used to be "Around the World in Eighty Days" . . . but now with the aid of the jet (plus cinerama) airplane, they have cut it down to 33 days. Sounds fast, but really allows enough time to see and enjoy each city.

Finally gave up organizing and conducting my own travel tours . . . took too much time arranging the accommodations, local tours, meals, etc., as well as selling the tour. HONG KONG is an intriguing city. Everyone wants to go to Hong Kong . . . at least to do a little shopping. But there is much more to see and do in this international Free Port. Bangkok, the capital of Thailand, is next on our itinerary.
