Pitchess Urges New Penalties

Stiffer penalties for assaults on peace officers have been urged by Los Angeles County Sheriff Peter Pitchess. Expressing concern about the mounting number of assaults on law enforcement officers, Pitchess called for a sentence of up to 15 years for persons convicted of assaulting officers.

"We cannot allow this trend to continue," he said. "We do our utmost to secure public awareness and support for law enforcement, but we must strengthen this activity by attempting to deter such assaults by the lawless elements of our community."

Pitchess said law enforcement officers represent the finest possible men and women. "The training we give them is the most rigorous and intensive that can be had anywhere," he added.

WITHOUT hesitancy we place these dedicated men and women in hazardous situations day after day. They, like soldiers, cannot shrink from a dangerous duty or assignment; they must attend; they must perform; they have no choice.

The constantly increasing crime load is a stark fact," Pitchess continued. It is also a fact that our law enforcement officers, in even greater numbers, are being assaulted and murdered. We must take positive measures to protect those who protect society."

THE SHERIFF said he recommended "urgent consideration" to amending Section 243 of the California Penal Code. He suggested a penalty of one to ten years in the state penitentiary for an assault on a law enforcement officer.

Pitchess also urged an amendment of Section 243 of the penal code to provide for a term of five to 15 years for an assault on a law officer with a deadly weapon.

He also urged amendment of the section to provide a term of life imprisonment for the attempted murder of a peace officer.

Unemployed To Get Pay Extension

Payment of unemployment insurance benefits to Californians will be extended to a maximum of 39 weeks beginning March 1, according to Albert B. Tieburg, director of employment.

Such action, based on the Miller-Collier amendment to the state unemployment insurance law enacted by the 1959 legislature, is taken when the insured unemployment during three calendar months is in excess of a six per cent ratio. The unemployment ratio of November and December of 1964 and January of 1965 triggered the March 1 extended duration of unemployment insurance benefits.

An average of 275,125 weeks of insured unemployment was certified during the three-month period. This amounted to 6.41 per cent of the statutory base of the average of 4,290,320 employees subject to the state Unemployment Insurance Code in the four calendar quarters that ended June 30, 1964.

The most recent prior extended benefit duration month was September of 1964.
