

New Look at Travel Weighed by Council

Is the travel policy for city commissions recently adopted by the City Council adequate? Councilmen asked themselves that question last night, but left the answer somewhat up in the air as they approved a request from

the Civil Service Commission for travel to Hawaii.

The Civil Service Commission sought permission for two members—Lawrence Townsend and George Morehart—to travel to Honolulu, Hawaii, for the Western Regional Public Personnel Conference April 11 to 16.

Mayor Albert Isen announced he was "not going to vote for this," and that sparked a short debate. Isen further suggested that commissioners be limited to in-state travel.

"Let's restrict all to travel to the state," Councilman David K. Lyman suggested.

H. Ted Olson suggested the council hold the request for a week and look at the policy they recently adopted.

The policy provides that all city commissions may send one member on one trip each fiscal year. Civil Service and Planning Commissions are permitted to send two representatives once each year because of the nature of their work.

"Maybe the policy should be changed," Isen told his colleagues.

To that, Olson replied that the fundamental question is "is it worthwhile? If it's foolishness, he continued, "they shouldn't go anywhere."

When City Manager Edward J. Ferraro was asked if he felt the trip to Honolulu was worthwhile, he told councilmen he believed the trip would be beneficial to the city.

Councilmen then approved the trip, 6-1, with Isen voting against it.

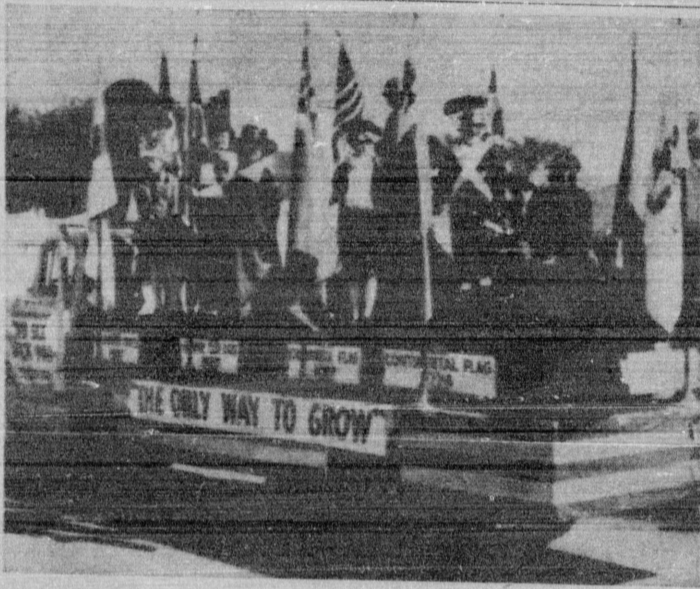
Three other travel requests were approved unanimously. "This is different," Isen announced as he joined the majority to approve the remaining trips. They include:

- Chicago, for an Advanced Management Training Program May 23-28 for Ferraro.

- San Francisco, for the annual California and Pacific Southwest Parks and Recreation conference, for Marilyn Jensen of the Recreation Department and Mrs. Naomi McVey, chairman of the Parks and Recreation Commission.

Ashley, who has served the college board for 12 years, submitted his resignation Feb. 19, citing a move to the San Francisco Bay area as the reason for his action. Jack N. Dabbs, vice president, will assume the post of president.

THE NEW board member has been closely associated with El Camino College in recent years and is the sole candidate from El Segundo to file for the college board post in elections to be conducted April 30.

His civic activities include participation in the American Field Service program, Junior Achievement Program and United Crusade. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge and is past associate guardian of Job's Daughters.

Neil, who has served in the capacity of training supervisor in the engineering department of Standard Oil Co., in El Segundo since 1959 has worked with El Camino College in conjunction with enrollment of company personnel in college courses. He has also assisted foreign students in their enrollment at El Camino, and was active recently in cooperation with the college and the American Petroleum Institute, in establishing a new class as part of the college curriculum.

Safeway to Raise Bread Loaf Weight

 Safeway Stores today announced that effective immediately all its Mrs. Wright's and Skylark breads have been increased in weight but not in price.

In making the announcement, D. Barrett Kane, Los Angeles division manager, said that the larger sizes are the result of Safeway's belief that its customers have a right to expect a standard loaf of bread to weigh a pound and a large loaf to weigh a pound and a half.

Present California law requires a standard loaf of bread to be labeled, "Standard loaf, minimum net weight 15 oz." or a large loaf to be labeled, "Standard large loaf, minimum net weight 1 lb. 8 1/2 oz." Safeway's loaves will meet these legal requirements but its standard loaf will weigh one full pound and its large loaf will weigh a full one and one-half pounds.

The new packaging will have large labels at both ends of the loaves clearly indicating the correct net weights, Kane stated.
