

# Treat All Income Alike, Says Former Commissioner

As Americans from coast to coast sharpen their pencils to figure out the income tax due Uncle Sam in just two months, a former Commissioner of Internal Revenue has made some suggestions about future taxation.

Mortimer M. Caplin, now in private law practice, says he believes the first thing that has to be done is to treat all kinds of income alike. In other words, that income from such activities as coal mining, timber cutting, certain types of cattle operations and even the capital-gains type of return from sale of a business should be regarded the same as income from salary or wages.

Mr. Caplin feels that the goal of our taxation program should be to put on equal footing the man earning a salary and the man with income from some other source, or sources.

The former Commissioner also thinks there should be established a high-level special commission to study U.S. taxation and make recommendations to Congress aimed at making the tax laws simpler and more effective.

**NEW FOOD SOURCE:** U. S. farmers harvested 700 million bushels of soybeans last year, and practically all of them were processed to separate their high-protein meal for animal feed and their high-fat oil for industrial uses and as an ingredient for such human foods as margarine.

There was no human food market for the whole bean as such, however. The reason? A bitter taste, plus factors that make it not easily digestible.

Now, Cargill, Inc. of Minneapolis, leading oilseed exporter and processor, has developed a method that makes the whole soybean tasty and more edible, and thus adaptable to a wide variety of food uses. Dr. A. Richard Baldwin, vice president and executive research director of Cargill, says the process makes possible the development of new types of ready-to-eat foods, especially snack foods, such as roasted and salted soybeans.

The Cargill process treats soybeans with infrared radiation for a controlled period at a specific temperature and moisture content. The result, Baldwin said, is a "toasted, nut-like flavor that is delicious, with improved nutritional value of the bean's proteins." He claimed the treatment is "easily accomplished and economical, and requires relatively simple equipment."

Cargill has no plans itself for manufacturing finished foods under the process, but will license other manufacturers to use it, he said.

**TICKING MERRILLY**

Quality watch sales in the United States are continuing on the rise, thanks to the pace set by Bulova Watch Co.'s ultra accurate Accutron electronic wrist timepiece, which made its consumer debut only a little more than four years ago.

Harry Bulova Henshel, president of the 91-year-old firm, told the New York Society of Security Analysts that more than 250,000 of the \$125-and-up timepieces have been sold since October, 1960, and the original series has mushroomed into 58 wrist models and 11 desk and table clocks.

The company also lists "100 different combinations of Accutron-based devices which are in use in more than 500 industrial and federal research and development laboratories and in space and defense contracting firms." The success of the Accutron together with the continuing rise in sales of the well-known Bulova line and its new economy-priced eniry, Caravelle watches, has brought the firm to the position where each of its three brands is now the U.S. sales leader in its price category. Bulova expects "at least a 10 to 15 per cent annual rate of increase in sales and earnings both for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1965 and for the years immediately ahead," Mr. Henshel added.

**SCIENCE NEWS**—Hospitalists soon will enter fully into the electronic age, in the opinion of a leading medical educator. Such automation will include use of sound beams to check pulse and blood pressure of the patient

and the installation in rooms of "console" control centers so that patients may have compressed air and oxygen administration, television and radio, and certain electronic examinations without the testing equipment's having to be moved into the room. . . . Navy scientists have measured the actual distance to the moon. Using radar waves bounced off the lunar surface, they determined that the mean distance between earth and moon varies between 221,463 and 252,710 miles, depending on the orbital position of the moon. . . . Science now seeks ways of giving drivers on freeways and other turnpikes, more room to dodge in emergencies. The goal is elimination of bridge piers, trees, light standards and other hazards.

children and adults with severe hearing loss. . . . Telephone shoulder rest with backing of adhesive, which prevents slipping. . . . New marker for glass, metal, plastics and other non-porous surfaces, available in nine colors. . . . New sauna heater, capable of heating 4-by-6-foot room to 180 degrees in just 15 minutes.

Passenger traffic over North Atlantic air routes rose 25 per cent in 1964 over 1963. . . . It is believed cuts in federal excise taxes will total as much as \$2.5 billion. . . . The nation's light bulb industry now is a \$500,000,000 annual business.
