## Parkway Students Hold Own Fine Arts Festival

A festival of fine arts—featuring an art gallery, exhibition of creative writing, and book exchange—was recently conducted at Parkway School.

Under the supervision of Mrs. Lillian Worley, a seventh-grade teacher, students organized the two-day event. Student committees collected materials from every class in the school, set up displays in the cafeteria and two classrooms, and manned the three areas during the event. Tours of the exhibit area were conducted by guides for each class according to a schedule arranged by the student committee.

Highlighting the creative writing exhibit in the cafeteria were dioramas, murals and drawings which depicted events in books the students had read in class. Book reports, original stories and poems, and other writings were displayed, and a tape recording of ballads written by students was played.

Art gallery displays ranged from textured drawings to magazine-decorated paper baskets. Included in the techniques exhibited were collage, mosaics, mobiles, and paintings done with a vegetable brush.

An outgrowth of the previous year's book fair, the book exchange served as a swap shop for booklovers. Student committees screened and priced the books preceding the festival and served as sales personnel during the event.

Parents were invited to tour exhibits in the evening following a PTA meeting during which students demonstrated art techniques.
