

Keith Bleakley to Get Bausch and Lomb Award

Keith Bleakley has been awarded the 1965 Bausch and Lomb Honorary Science Award at Torrance High School, according to Dr. Carl R. Ahee, principal.

"These awards are especially significant," Dr. Ahee said. "Today, everyone realizes the importance of the study of science in our secondary schools. The Bausch and Lomb Science Award provides recognition to senior students with the highest

scholastic standing in science subjects.

The bronze medal is presented annually to more than 8,500 high school seniors. Bleakley will receive the medal during commencement exercises in June.

Winners of the medal also are eligible to compete for science scholarships at the University of Rochester. Three grants are sponsored by Bausch and Lomb, while the university awards additional scholarships.

'Gone With the Wind' Still Popular in County Library

"Gone With the Wind," the best seller by Margaret Mitchell, first published in 1936, is still being read avidly by patrons of the Los Angeles County Public Library system, according to County Librarian William S. Geller.

Geller recently saw a brand new copy of the civil war era novel at one of the 91 community libraries in the system. He opened it up and discovered it was the 643rd copy of the book that the County Library had purchased during the nearly 29 years that it has been in print. Checking further he found that 412 copies are still on the shelves of County Libraries and that there is still a continuing demand to read the book.

"Gone With the Wind" continues to be in demand and the County Library will continue to provide copies of it so long as it is being read, Geller said.

Then there is my husband's favorite system: "That kid," he will command, pointing a menacing finger at one of our quivering children, "is GROUND-ED for the weekend. No phone calls. No social activi-

ties. Nothing." With that, he will pick up his suitcase and depart, for, by a strange coincidence, he is forced to stay away from home that very weekend on business.

Bud Edwards will serve as co-chairman of the dance. A well known dance band from the area will furnish music for the dance, which

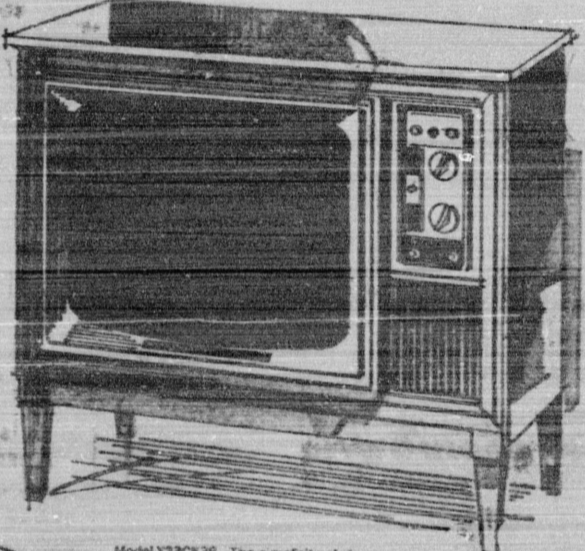
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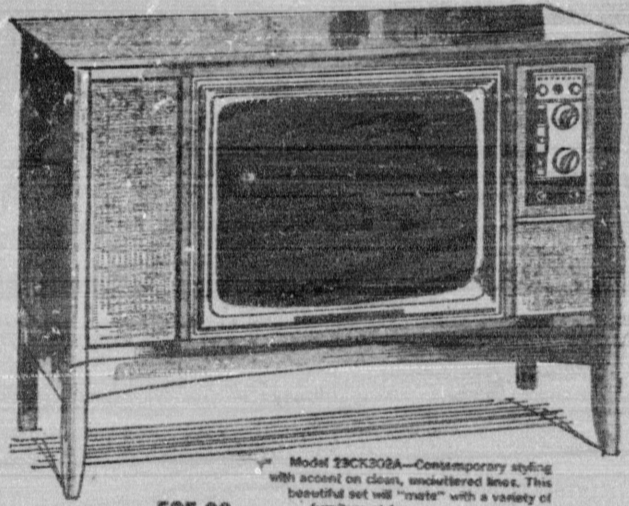


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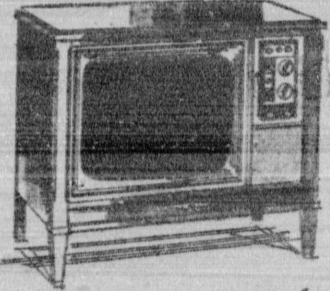


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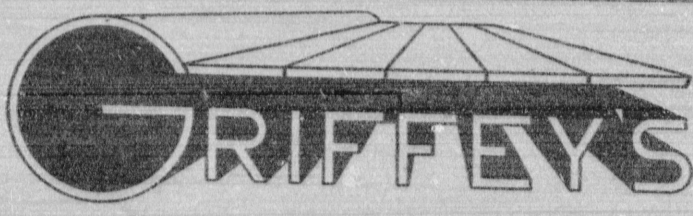


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
