During World War II, Bundy entered the Armed Services and rose in ranks from Private to Major, seeing over six years of active duty in Air Force intelligence in every major theater of war. He received National China's aviation decoration from Major General Claire Chennault of the 14th Air Force and five other battle stars for major engagements.

After the war he served as Chief of Research and Analysis of the Intelligence Section Headquarters and Briefing Officer for the Alaskan Air Command, returning to the U.S. in 1948, and became City Editor of the Daily Journal in Wheaton, Illinois.
