May of 1965 will mark the 20th anniversary of the fall of the Third Reich. It will also mark the end of the statute of limitations on Nazi war crimes. Any war criminal not apprehended by this time will be free from prosecution. Many high ranking Nazis disappeared after the war without a trace. The West German government is now considering a bill to extend the statute of limitations 10 more years. The Pennies Photographer asked several people around City Hall: "Do you think the statute of limitations on war crimes should be extended?"

Jim Faselk, 237 Via Los Miraflores Ave. "I think they should let the law run out. Any Nazis left over from World War II would be pretty old by now anyway. They couldn't give any trouble."

Alana Smith, 5406 Norton St. "The war has been over for 20 years and I think we should forget it. If there are some criminals that haven't been caught in 20 years I doubt if they will be caught in another 10. They have to live with their consciences."

Marjorie Moss, 1505 Floorwood Ave. "It should be extended! Atrocities this serious shouldn't be forgotten. War criminals should be brought to justice no matter how long it takes."

Bill K. White, 4616 Obispo Ave. "There should be no statute of limitations on murder. To have one on genocide is completely unrealistic. These crimes were committed against humanity and the criminals should be liable for punishment at anytime."

Richard E. Rankin, 2322 W. 17th St. "Crime is crime, and the element of time between the act and the capture of the criminal is not important. The guilt of the criminals is the same, no matter how long it takes to capture him. The statute should be extended!"

## Torrance Gets \$2,756 For Officer Training

The City of Torrance presented \$2,756 by Chief of Police Walter R. Koenig as its share of the 1964 allocation from the California Peace Officers' Training Fund.

"Torrance qualified for the money by strictly adhering to the standards for selection and training of peace officers prescribed in the Administrative and Penal Codes of California," said Koenig.

He reported that the prime objective of the Peace Officer Standards and Training Program is to raise the level of competence of local police officers and deputy sheriffs

through the establishment of minimum standards for their selection and training.

SIX NEWLY employed officers and four supervisory officers were trained by the City of Torrance in 1964 the Los Angeles Sheriff's Training Academy. Each new trainee received a total of 744 hours of basic classroom instruction in addition to field training. Supervisory officers underwent an average of 80 hours on instruction.

Accepting the check on behalf of the community was Edward J. Ferraro, city manager.
