Another factor arguing for conservative value judgments was that at the time the State also levied a property tax against these assessments. Since the State tax rate was standard throughout the state, County assessors apparently began to inch their assessments downward to keep less money from goining to Sacramento. (As an example, if County A and B had id en tica I amounts of property of A and B had identical amounts of property of \$1,000,000 in full cash value, but County A used an 80 per cent ratio while County B still maintained 100 per cent assessments, County A's assessment roll would be only \$800,000 against County B's \$1,000,000 roll. With a statewide tax rate of \$1.00 a hundred, County A would only pay \$8,000 to the state erty on which County B had to pay \$10,000.)

of this century, assessments dropped and leveled off at about a 50 per cent ratio. However, during the Depres-However, during the Depression, property values nosedived and assessments dropped accordingly. As the economy picked up in the late 30s and then into the war years, assesments never generally returned to the 50 per cent ratio except on certain classes of property. When the State Board of Equalization began in 1955. When the State Board of Equalization began in 1955 to find the prevailing aver-age assessment ratios, Coun-ties generally were at the 25 per cent level.


