Voter League Launches Study in 'Equalities'

A two year study and evaluation of opportunity for equality in education and employment will be launched this week at a series of meetings scheduled at Torrance League of Women Voters members' homes. Entitled "Development of Human Resources," the study was adopted by the League of Women Voters of the United States at its national convention last year.

Stating the problem of inequality of opportunity and exploring the extent to which it exists nationally will be the first phase of the study, according to Mrs. F.W.H. van Oppen, research committee chairman. The study will progress into a survey of existing and proposed programs to better develop the nation's human resources and an evaluation of their effectiveness.

"The timeliness of this study makes our research particularly challenging," said Mrs. van Oppen. "Hardly a day goes by without finding a news story referring to industrial retraining programs, propos-

als by local school boards to curb school drop-outs, or debate over proposed federal legislation," she added.
