Guest Pastor Will Speak At Covenant

Guest pastor at the Immanuel Lutheran Church, 706 Knob Hill, Redondo Beach is the Rev. O. A. Waech, who will continue his ministry through Palm Sunday speaking at the 8:30 and 11 p.m. Sunday services. Mr. Waech, long identified with the development of missions throughout North and South America, relinquished his international post to concentrate his efforts in meeting the challenge of growth on the West Coast as executive secretary of stewardship for churches of the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, or Arizona and Southern California.

The Rev. A. L. T. Schuetz, former pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church, has accepted an assignment in Las Cruces, New Mexico, and guest pastors will conduct the church's services until a new pastor is appointed.

Guest Pastor Leads Sermon At Immanuel

Guest speaker at the Rolling Hills Covenant Church service tonight will be the Rev. Wilfried J. Naujoks, director of Christian Service and a member of the faculty of the German Bible Institute in Seeheim a.d. Bergstrasse, Germany. Mr. Naujoks' subject will be "Behind the Wall of Shame." The service will begin at 7 p.m.

The speaker was reared in Germany during the 12 years of the Nazi regime and served as a leader in the Hitler youth organization for a number of years. His father, an officer in the Salvation Army, was arrested on the first day of World War II for anti-Nazi remarks. Mr. Naujoks was converted from Nazism to Christianity in 1943.

The Rev. Robert A. Honnette's Lenten message at the morning service will be "The Work of God." The Rolling Hills Covenant Church is located at 2221 Palos Verdes Drive North.

Lecture Slated in San Pedro

"The Light by Which We See" is the title of a public Christian Science lecture to be given Tuesday in San Pedro.

Noel D. Bryan-Jones of Worthing, England, will be speaker under the sponsorship of the Seventh Church of Christ, Scientist, Los Angeles. The lecture will begin at 8 p.m. at the church, 1010 S. Cabrillo Ave., San Pedro.

Bryan-Jones is a former council member of the British Optical Association. He resigned several years ago to devote himself to the public practice of Christian Science healing. He is currently on tour as a member of the Board of Lectureship of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Boston, Mass.

Minister to Speak on Red Infiltration

Charges that "Communist infiltration of American youth by means of a long-range, systematic plan to sabotage American culture, religion and beliefs," will be made by the Rev. David Noeble of the Christian Crusade, when he speaks at Torrance High School April 2 at 7:30 p.m.

Mr. Noeble contends that present day "beat" or "rock 'n roll" music is in reality a Communist effort to control the thoughts and behavior of American children and youth. Admission is without charge.

Schools To Have 34,000

Nearly 34,000 students will attend Torrance schools next fall, according to early calculations by district officials. Predicted enrollment of 33,489 students by Oct. 1 is up 1,421 over present attendance figures.

Increases are almost equally divided between elementary and high school enrollment, with 737 more students headed for the elementary schools and 684 students to attend the city's four public high schools.

PRESENT enrollment is 23,749 elementary students and 8,319 high school students. Anticipated enrollment for the 1965-66 school year is 24,486 elementary students and 9,003 high school students.

Biggest increase will be at Victor Elementary School, which expects an additional 334 students bringing total enrollment to 1,502 students. Eight new classrooms are currently under construction at the Victor School site.

New housing developments will be responsible for an additional 169 students at Hickory School, 134 students at Meadow Park School, and 95 students at Madrona School. Six classrooms are presently being built at Madrona.

SOUTH HIGH will continue to have the largest secondary student body, with North High rapidly approaching South's enrollment figures. An increase of 73 students will bring South attendance up to 2,835; while a gain of 212 students will bring North High up to 2,667 students.

School Science Fair Scheduled

There's a new look in Torrance homes. Rumpus rooms are beginning to resemble research centers, and living rooms look like laboratories. Garages and bedrooms have also gone scientific-modern. A new trend in decorating? —Not exactly. The "scientific look" is temporary.

As symptomatic of spring as blossoms and baseball is the flurry of scientific activity by Torrance youngsters preparing exhibits for annual school science fairs.

With district competition set for late next month, school fairs are erupting throughout the city like ice-plant on an April hillside.

Winners at each school will enter their displays at the all-school Science Fair at West High School April 29 and 30. Competition will be in two categories — physical and biological, and awards will go to the first, second, and third place individual and group entries in each category.

Each elementary school will submit two entries in the finals, and each high school will enter 15 exhibits.

Mrs. Beverly Annis of West High is chairman for the all-school fair. Entries will be judged on the basis of scientific thought, creative ability, clarity and dramatic value, thoroughness, and technical skill.

Following judging Thursday afternoon, April 29, exhibits will be open to the public from 6 to 9 p.m. that evening and the following day from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.
