POPPY SEED EGG BREAD

1 loaf (1 lb.) Bridgford ready-to-bake frozen bread

1 egg
1 tbs. milk
2 tbs. poppy seeds (about)

Remove frozen loaf from bag. Let thaw at room temperature until soft and easily handled. Grease the top before thawing to keep bread from crustling.

Using a knife, mark loaf into three equal parts. Use two-thirds of the loaf for the

bottom braid. Cut it into three equal parts and make a rope of each about 15 inches long.

Beat egg lightly with fork and mix with milk. Dip each rope into egg mixture; then



sprinkle with poppy seeds. Fasten the three ropes together at one end and make a braid for the bottom part of the loaf.

Place on well greased baking sheet. Cut the remaining one-third of the dough into three equal parts and form each into a rope about 10 inches long. Dip each rope in egg mixture and sprinkle with poppy seeds.

Make a braid of the three smaller ropes and place on top of first large braid. Let rise in very warm place (90 to 120 degrees) until light or increased in volume two or three times.

To tell when bread is ready to bake, touch lightly with fingertip. If it leaves a slight impression, it is ready to bake. Bake the

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Construction on a major addition of the Torrance facility of Garret Corporation's AiResearch Manufacturing Division will begin this month, according to James V. Crawford, vice president and AiResearch manager.

The company will build a modern 123,000 square foot warehouse building scheduled to be completed in September.

The new addition will bring the total work area at the 190th Street site to more than 500,000 square feet. This eventually will be expanded to more than double according to a long range master plan for development of the 70 acre property.

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The warehouse is being designed by AiResearch's plant engineering department. Building contractor is Del E. Webb Corp.

CONSTRUCTION will be tilt-up precast concrete, similar to the existing buildings. At ground level the warehouse will cover an area 100 by 400 feet. A basement will provide an additional storage area larger than a football field. The addition is aimed at

consolidating the major portion of AiResearch's warehouse, shipping and receiving functions under one roof. Upon completion, employees will transfer from five other locations to Torrance, according to Crawford.

Material handling will be facilitated by a five-ton freight elevator and a six-ton capacity crane which will travel the entire length of the building.

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
