'Baby Care' Course Set By Red Cross

Teacher Courses Help Students in Reading

When Torrance teachers discovered last fall that the explosion of knowledge had been making inroads on the field of teaching of reading since they had finished school, they decided to get in the swim.

District officials sat down and figured out which new

developments would help local teachers do a more effective job and then asked administrators of the University of California in Los Angeles extension school if they could arrange to feature them in a course to be given in Torrance.

They suggested that the university line up the outstanding persons in the field and bring them here as guest lecturers in a seminar program aimed at keeping teachers abreast with latest trends in reading.

Result is an extension course, "Special Approaches to Reading," currently being offered at Crenshaw School which 84 Torrance teachers are enrolled in.

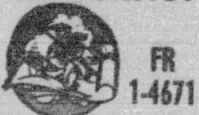
Not only are district teachers learning latest research, techniques and methods of reading instruction; but they are getting their information directly from the specialists who are making news in the reading field.

"In addition to surveying the total field of reading, the course is helping teachers to devise new techniques for diagnosing children's reading problems," says Dr. Lloyd Jones, district curriculum consultant.

Among the specialists who have been featured to date are: Dr. Marianne Frostig, Frostig School of Educational Therapy; Dr. Robert L. Doc-

ter, professor of education at San Fernando Valley State College; and Dr. Frances Berres, assistant director of psychology Clinic School at UCLA.
