Mothers Club Gives Aid to Sunair Home

Two members of South Bay Mothers of Twins Club Mrs. Robert Jackson, president, and Mrs. W. R. Campbell, past-president, visited the Sunair Home for Asthmatic Children in Tujunga and presented Richard Irmas, executive secretary, with a check for \$600, proceeds from their recent fashion show. Mrs. Jackson and Mrs. Campbell toured Sunair's facilities which include comfortable dormitories, library, dining and recreation area, hospital wing, dental office, infirmary room and research laboratories.

Sunair has a program of research to isolate the causes of children's asthma and to find more effective treatments. Children, from ages six to twelve, are treated with no restrictions as to race, color or creed. Sunair is a non-sectarian, non-profit organization entirely supported by private contributions.

Other charities supported by Twin Club are the pediatric ward at Harbor General Hospital, Southwest Association for Retarded Children and assistance to a needy family with twins.
