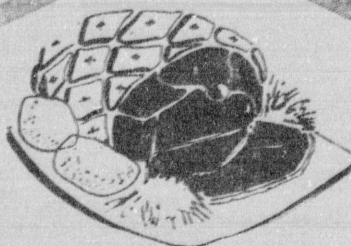

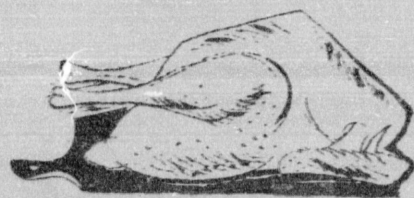

Educator Speaks at Conference

An assistant superintendent of the Torrance Unified School District was one of seven conference committee members for a statewide meeting last week to probe improvement of efficiency in school management.

S. E. Waldrip helped direct the 38th annual conference of the California Association of Public School Business Officials at the Biltmore Hotel in Los Angeles.

More than 1,300 persons attended the three-day session.

The meeting is called annually by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to discuss the logistics that go into the operation of California's vast education complex.

Topics discussed included: accounting, data processing, insurance, maintenance, personnel, purchasing, financing, school luncheons, transportation and legislation.
