Navy Sets Two-Year Ensign Plan

The Navy has announced the establishment of the two-year Contract NROTC Program for male college sophomores and junior college graduates who are starting their junior year next fall, according to Chief Meteney of the U. S. Navy Recruiting Branch Station, 1526 Craven Ave.

The program provides \$40 monthly retainer pay during the last two years of college and upon graduation leads to a commission as an ensign in the U. S. Navy Reserve or second lieutenant in the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve.

If accepted to the program the student will attend a special six week training program this summer at UCLA. Upon successful completion of the training period, the student will begin college in the fall at USC, UCLA or any one of more than 50 colleges and universities throughout the nation which offer the NROTC Program.
