**County to Aid Residents Fight Against Mosquitoes**

Heavy rainfalls with localized flooding, plus the anticipated warming of late April weather are likely to combine to produce happy circumstances for mosquitoes, unless someone intervenes appropriately in each wet-hot spot.

Intervention usually requires public as well as private effort. A very effective means of mosquito prevention in situations which are suitable, a measure used both in large bodies of water as

well as in small ornamental home ponds, is the use of nature's own arch-enemy of the mosquito, *Gambusia affinis*.

The *Gambusia affinis*, a small, guppy-like fish, has a worldwide reputation for its enormous appetite for mosquito eggs and larvae. If these fish are in a pond where a mosquito lays her eggs, they will make sure that not one of her hundreds of offspring will ever take wing.

USED IN MANY thousands of acres of water covering

public land in the Los Angeles area, mosquito fish are given away each summer at no charge to individuals who wish them for mosquito control on their property. Because the fish are intended for mosquito control purposes only, they are available only to persons over the age of 16.

Beginning in May, special fish distribution will be made from various health centers, schedules of which will appear in newspapers. In the meanwhile, and on through the summer, individuals wishing mosquito fish may obtain them from the Los Angeles State and County Arboretum and Botanic Gardens, 301 N. Baldwin Ave., Arcadia, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

Information on seasonal distribution locations in other areas of the county may be obtained by calling Mosquito Abatement District offices as follows: San Fernando Valley, PO 6-3981; South Gate, 923-5486; Culver City, EX 1-2248; Antelope Valley, the Lancaster Health Center, WH 8-4615. HOMEOWNERS who do not

have pools, ornamental pools or other bodies of untreated water should take inventory of their home to make sure they are not providing breeding grounds for mosquitoes. Even a tablespoon of water which is allowed to stand for a few days in warm weather may be the source of swarms of the annoying insect.

Homes should be checked for standing water in saucers under potted plants, clogged roof gutters, watering cans, discarded tires and tin cans, street gutters, house cooler units, children's wading
