Chadwick School Slates New Edison Station in Production Lectures on Education

Chadwick School in Rolling Hills is sponsoring a series of three lectures and a panel discussion on "Current Trends in American Education." The series will be held at the school in the Vanderlip Auditorium on four consecutive Thursday beginning tomorrow at 7:30 p.m. The series will be open to the public and there will be no admission charge.

The lecture series is being directed by John Phipps, a science instructor at Chadwick. According to Phipps, "the purpose of the series is to help the people of the peninsula area to become more familiar with the revolution that is occurring in American education. This revolution should not be thought of as being limited to teachers, administrators, and others directly concerned with the education of your youth. Quite to the contrary, American Education has always been primarily a local responsibility and it therefore

belongs to every citizen to keep abreast of current developments in education. A lack of interest on the part of our citizens could cause us to lose control over our schools, which have the power to shape the future of our society."

Reassignment Of Beds Is Meeting Topic

A review of bed reassignment at the Riviera Community Hospital was the main item of business at the Hospital Planning Association of Southern California meeting Thursday at St. John's Hospital, Santa Monica.

The planning association is the voluntary Southern California organization dedicated to the advancement of proper hospital planning and the efficient providing of hospital facilities where and when they are needed.

The title of Dr. Dodson's speech will be "Summerhill," which deals with a radical approach to child rearing. His speech will be based on a book of the same title written by A. S. Niel.

The second lecture, scheduled Thursday, April 29, will be given by E. M. Swengle, who will speak on "The Development of Montessori Psychology in Theory and Practice and its Application from Preschool to College." The Montessori Method was written by Maria Montessori. The third lecture on Thursday, May 6, will be given by John Lewis on "Current Problems in our Society and Their Implications for Education."

The fourth and final meeting will be a panel discussion among the lecturers, and will be moderated by Chadwick's Headmaster, Pierson F. Melcher.

Another major power-producer for Southerlanders was officially declared "completed" and placed in commercial operation this month at Southern California Edison Company's El Segundo steam-electric generating station.

L. E. Jenkins, Edison district manager, said the company's new Unit No. 4 at El Segundo quietly joined the Edison "family" of power sources without fanfare—simply by a transfer of jurisdiction from the company's engineering department to its operating people.

The new unit cost about \$30 million and is capable in itself of generating enough electricity to serve a city of roughly 400,000 people, Jenkins said.

It has an effective operating capacity of 335,000 kilowatts and its completion makes the El Segundo station the biggest single power-producer on the Edison system, with a combined capability of more than a million kilowatts. Unit No. 4 swells Edison's total investment at El Segundo

to over \$100 million, he pointed out.

This newest unit and El Segundo's third unit, which was placed in service last August, are the biggest built to date by the Edison Company. Even larger units are now under construction, however, at the company's Alamitos station near Long Beach and at the San Onofre Nuclear generating station at Camp Pendleton, Jenkins said.

HE NOTED that as important as the El Segundo station is in meeting the increasing power requirements of the

Southland, it also is a significant source of tax revenue to local taxing agencies.

With completion of Unit No. 4, taxes paid by Edison as a result of this one station's operation will total approximately \$2½ million annually, he estimated.
