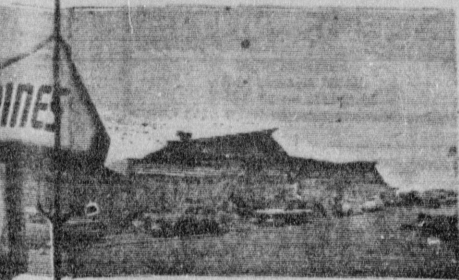

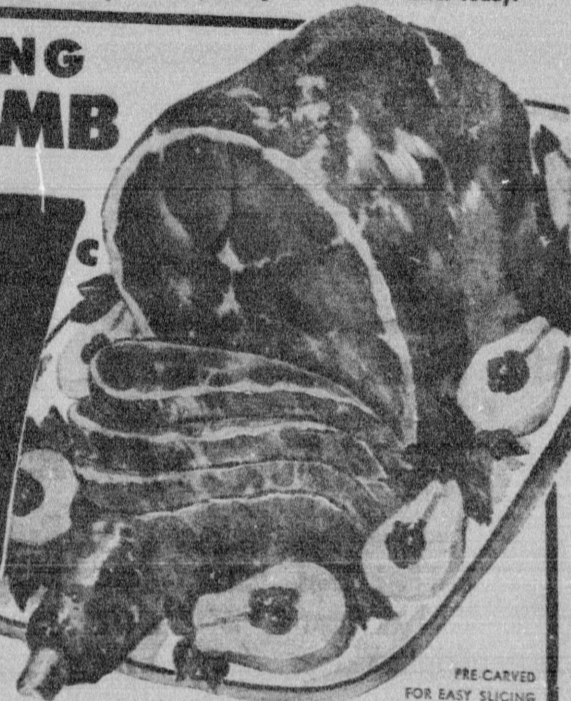

BOYS' WEEK OBSERVANCE

Youths to Take Over Los Angeles for Day

More than 5,000 boys who attend school in Los Angeles will be saluted April 25 through May 1 during the 43rd annual observance of Boys' Week in Los Angeles. All phases of the community, including government, business, industry, armed forces, recreation, and churches, will join in honoring the young men. "Building Better Boys" is the theme of the week-end celebration which begins Sunday. Highlight of the week will be Tuesday, when young men from high schools take over the chief governmental jobs in Los Angeles. Students will fill more than 320 jobs in city, county, state, and federal offices in Los Angeles. Steve Hultquist, a 17-year-old senior at Huntington Park High, will become mayor for a day, replacing Samuel W. Yorty. The annual observance, first began in 1923, is sponsored by the Council for the Promotion of Boys' Welfare. Former sheriff Eugene W. Miscalluz is president of the council. Local boys from Carson, Narbonne, and Gardena High schools will participate in the youth government day. Carson High boys include: Bill Atkinson, 17, replacing Municipal Judge Harold Shepherd; Tom Beach, 17, replacing Thad F. Brown, deputy chief commander of the detective division; Steve Covington, 17, who will take Supervisor Burton W. Chace's place; Sam Lee Jr., 18, who will replace Superior Court Judge John Frazer, and Joseph Shofner, 17, replacing Samuel B. Nelson, general manager of the Department of Water and Power. Narbonne students are: Ronald Donigan, 17, replacing City Councilman John S. Gibson; Tom Johnson, 18, who will take the place of Superior Court Judge Otto J. Emme; Bill Kopp, 18, to replace H. J. Murray, deputy in charge of the Los Angeles Land Records Division; Antonio Vilella, 17, replacing juvenile division commander William L. Richey, and Glen Yates, 18, who replaces Glenn G. Gooder, dean of student personnel at Harbor College. Gardena High boys include: Steve Adress, 17, who will take District Attorney Evelle J. Younger's position; Eddie DeBoer, 17, replacing Municipal Judge Philip M. Newman; Eugene Hardev, 18, replacing Appellate Court Judge Harold P. Huls; Glenn Konatz, 16, replacing T. M. Blakeslee, chief electrical engineer for the Department of Water and Power; Lloyd R. LaCuesta, 17, replacing U.S. Probation and Parole chief A. D. McEuche; Thomas A. Nickent, 17, who will take the place of John W. Powers, inspector commander for police patrol area No. 1; and Tony Trinkle, 17, replacing Superior Court Judge David Williams.

Public Schools Week Programs Slated Here

Hundreds of thousands of parents and students are expected to participate in a variety of special programs at nearly 600 Los Angeles City Schools during the 46th annual observance of Public Schools Week, April 26 through 30. Superintendent of Schools Jack P. Crowther has urged all school system residents to take advantage of Public Schools Week to visit the schools. "The programs planned throughout the district will provide an excellent opportunity for all persons—not just parents with children in schools—to observe the work being done to educate the young people of our community," he said. CROWTHER said the Public Schools Week programs are designed to bring the community into a closer working relationship with the schools. Mayor Samuel W. Yorty already has proclaimed the week as Public Schools Week and joined school officials in urging community participation in the special programs. The 46th annual week in honor of public schools is co-sponsored by the Masonic Lodges of California. This year's slogan is "Help Build a Better America — Support Our Public Schools." SPECIAL SCHOOL programs will include such activities as open houses, pageants and classroom visitations. Some schools, however, have found it necessary to schedule programs other than the week of April 26-30. Schools serving the immediate area have planned a variety of special programs. Open houses, classroom visitations, and special exhibits are planned in most area schools. Carson St., April 26-30, 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.; May 7, 10 a.m. 25902 Eshelman Ave., Lomita, April 27, 7:30 to 9 p.m.; Halldale Ave., 21514 Halldale Ave., April 29, 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. OTHERS ARE: Harbor City, 1508 W. 254th St., April 30, 10 a.m. and Lomita Elementary, 2211 W. 247th St., April 30, 1:15 to 5 p.m. Carson High School will hold open house from 7 to 9:30 p.m. April 29, and Narbonne High will observe open house April 29 from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Los Angeles Harbor College will sponsor conducted tours of the campus April 28 at 1:30 and 7:30 p.m.
