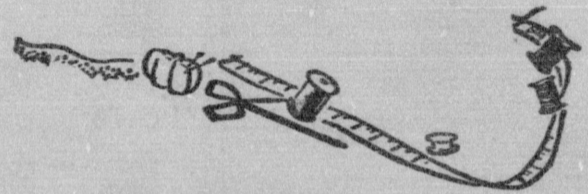

Diana Drive to Aid Christian Hacienda

The Christian Hacienda in Mexico is major interest for members of the Redondo Beach Dianas at the present time. The Dianas are collecting used clothing, towels, wash cloths, dishes and glasses for the settlement, which was started one year ago by Irwin Ford and his Mexican wife.

The 35-acre refuge is for widows and their children. At present, there are 106 people there, 80 of them children. They live in huts, tents and donated house trailers. They recently bought a tractor and built a mill and water system and hope to build a medical clinic.

Mrs. Bruce Wilkinson, International Affairs chairman for the Dianas, will make the trip to the refuge later this spring to deliver the items. She and her husband will also take pictures, which will be shown to club members.

Mr. Thomsen, who has been with the State Dept. in Viet Nam for

the past two years, was injured in the recent bombing of the Embassy there and was hospitalized for sometime.

On Easter Sunday morning, the family attended services at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church where two years ago on that day, the Thomsens' two-year-old daughter, Katie had been baptised. The Thomsens were also

married at St. Andrew's. Mrs. Thomsen is the former Judy Wolf.

After the services, Mr. and Mrs. Wolf entertained at an Easter buffet at their Halldale Avenue home.
