SB 797 would require adult children who are capable to contribute to the support of their parents who are receiving Medical Assistance for the Aged.

claim on the estate of recipi-ents of all aid programs to recover an amount equal to

while residents of other states must reside in California 5 years before becoming eligi-ble for Aid to the Blind or Aid to the Disabled. "Taxpayers who are con-cerned about ever-mounting welfare giveaways should urge their legislators to sup-port these Sturgeon bills," Arnold commented.
