Carburetor Firm Makes New Anti-Smog Advance

Every one knows there's a human population explosion, but there seems to be an opposite trend in some of our American livestock.

Farms in the 10 corn belt states had 8 per cent fewer hogs and pigs on March 1 than a year ago, according to the Crop Reporting Board. Furthermore, the pig population there was 10 per cent below the 1963 total. Inventories in each of the states were down, and Iowa, the leading hog-producing state, was down 4 per cent in the past year.

Are Americans becoming less fond of ham, bacon, pork chops and sausages? Whatever the reason, farmers in the corn belt kept 7 per cent fewer hogs and pigs for breeding purposes. This, the report said, reflects "planned reductions." Maybe nobody's listening to that hungry boy on radio who keeps calling "More sausages, Mom."

ANTI-SMOG ADVANCE — A major advance in carburetor design for furthering the anti-smog programs of automobile manufacturers has been announced by the Carter Carburetor division of ACF Industries, Inc. The development was described by the engineering and research director as "an adjustable air bleed that controls the fuel mixture through the driving speed ranges that are most productive of hydrocarbon emissions, or smog." The improvement is scheduled for use in many of Carter's 1966 carburetors.

A carburetor with this feature is set permanently to help control the flow of fuel so as to produce the best lean mixtures without affecting normal idling of the engine. The new carburetor also reduces the enrichment of fuel during deceleration from high speed, another source of smog, the company spokesman said. Any effect on gasoline mileage would be positive, rather than negative, he added.

The design refinement, according to the research laboratory, also contributes to uniform carburetor quality.

Ranger 9 Display Now Open

Interest in the earth's lunar satellite has increased since the recent Ranger 9 moonshot, and visitors at Griffith Park Observatory's Hall of Science may see views of the moon taken by the spaceship's cameras, according to the Los Angeles City Recreation and Parks Department.

Dr. Clarence H. Clemenshaw, director of the Observatory, said a one-sixth scale model of the Ranger 9 spacecraft is on display in the Observatory's Hall of Science. Television pictures taken by Ranger 9 shortly before impact last March 24 show the moon's craters and surface features.

Visitors may also view the earthquake recording machines recently installed in the Observatory. The instrument was originally designed by Dr. Hugo Benioff for the Cal-Tech Seismological Station.

POINTING OUT that this is one of the few seismological stations open to the public, Dr. Clemenshaw said the instrument will write two records: one for short period waves to record local earthquakes and the other to show distant earth tremors.

The Hall of Science houses an array of exhibits which explain the basic laws of physics. On display are a model of the University of California's cyclotron, the complicated machine credited with opening the door to development of use of atomic energy; the Foucault pendulum which confirms visually the earth's spinning on its axis, a model of the 200-inch Mount Palomar telescope; the Tesla coil, which generates a current of 1 million volts, and many other exhibits.

SCIENCE NEWS — American College of Physicians heard of successful use of bacteria in fighting bacterial diseases. Patient with long-standing staphylococcal infection was cured by infection with another strain of bacteria, a harmless one. . . . Tests are being made in Oslo, Norway, to test the dietary prevention of heart attacks on 10 to 15 thousand men aged 50 to 59, and to find whether a tablespoon of linoleic acid daily will ward off attacks.

Linseed oil, which contains the acid, is being used in the tests, which will run one and a half to two years. . . . Geologists using aerial surveying, have located a 150-mile string of mysterious magnetic rocks in Canada.

MORE OIL AT HOME — How much longer will this country have oil to burn? Seeking an answer, The Oil Shale Corp. — part of the first U.S. commercial oil shale operation — has come up with

some figures on our total oil consumption, which has been rising more than 3 per cent each year. Current consumption is estimated at more than 10 million barrels of oil daily. That's two and a half gallons for each man, woman and child.

Government oil experts say there's no danger that we'll run out of oil any time soon. But they are concerned that spiraling costs for finding oil have all but stopped additions to our crude oil reserves.

What's more, our reliance on foreign supplies has risen to 20 per cent and last year, for the first time, more oil was produced in the Middle East than in the United States. This trend, according to some experts, is a threat to national defense.

The government and private companies are now active in the Colorado Rockies trying to unlock oil from acres of valuable shale rock. There are recent estimates that Colorado shale alone can yield

more than a trillion barrels. . . . **BITS O' BUSINESS** — Automobile production, and sales too, appear headed for new records again. First-quarter output may be the highest for any single quarter. January sales, measured by registrations, were up almost 9 per cent over the same month in 1964, which was the largest January on record. . . . Under the mint's crash program, 200 million nickels will be made every month until the short-

age ends. . . . Chesapeake and Ohio Railway has its eyes on gaining control of the Chicago, South Shore and South Bend Railroad, and already holds more than 100,000 shares of that electric line.

Monon Railroad, seeking control for some time, is also said to own a large block of the stock. . . . If the Pennsylvania and New York Central lines are given final approval to merge, the system will be the nation's largest railroad network.

flood bulb, can be used for commercial displays or for more light in the home. . . . Narrow-work holder for paper cutters that can hold paper and cardboard with cutting widths down to 1/8-inch permitting safe two-hand control of cutters.
