#### Teamed for a Purpose

To educate their four children was the reason Sam and Antonette Carcerano, 2830 Gramercy, sought employment at Harbor General Hospital in 1948 and got it. Sam, 54, is custodian foreman, and Antonette, 48, is an x-ray darkroom assistant. Antonette started at Harbor as a dietary worker, loading food trucks and feeding patients in the polio ward. After six months, she transferred to nursing and began inservice training. Carrying out their duties, their paths often meet. ## 'People... Heart of the Hospital'

"People — Heart of the Hospital" is the theme of National Hospital Week, ob-served throughout the na-tion from today through next Saturday, May 15.

National Hospital Week was officially designated in 1953, setting aside the week including May 12, birthday of Florence Nightingale, founder of the nursing pro-fession, who was born May 12, 1820. In 1921, Miss Nightingale's birthday was designated as Hospital Day.

Three principal objectives of the week's observance are: to help build commun-ily understanding and re-spect for the important hu-man element in high quality patient care; to help foster good morale among hospital employees; and to encour-age young people to consid-er hospital careers, of which there are over 100 excludthere are over 100 exclud-ing the medical and nursing professions.

The nationwide observ-ance is also devised to draw attention of the public to the American hospitals, which offer the finest in medical for the finest in medical care, medical re-search and the advance-ment in hospital equipment, such as the linear accelerasuch as the linear accelera-tor, improved cancer-fight-ing machine, installed at the Harbor General Hospi-tal at the time of its open-ing Feb. 23, 1963, as well as an electronic microscope, and the latest in other laboratory equipment.

Heart of the Harbor Gen-eral Hospital, eight-story \$15,400,000 building.opened in Torrance Feb. 23, 1963, as a result of a bond issue, is the people of the South Bay area, who spend hours as volunteer workers at the hospital. The important hu-man element of high quality patient care is stressed by the Women's Auxiliaries, the Women's Auxiliaries, the teen-age Candy Stripers and organizations of the area, who include the hos-pital in their philanthropies.

These volunteer workers bring the "heart of the community" to this mam-moth operation in service to the sick and elderly. "Heart of the Hospital" is the 1600 employees who make up the hospital per-sonnel. sonnel.

Many husband and wife teams are included in the 1,600 personnel who man the 729 bed hospital. These couples' teams are found, not only in the medical and nursing phase of the hospi-tal operation but in the laboratory, dietary fields, custodial services, transpor-tation departments, and many other necessary serv-ices in hospital operation.

It takes "heart and peo-ple"for the mammoth op-eration of the Harbor Gen-eral Hospital which, since its opening has cared for 23,000 bed patients, includ-ing 3,000 births. Another busy contingent of workers are found in the hospital's out-patient clinic, which to date has handled 250,000 visitations.



#### The Doctor and His Nurse

Included in the "people" program at the Harbor General Hospital are a number of "husband and wife" teams. Among them Dr. Nelson Frissell and his wife, Karen, a registered nurse. Dr. Nelson will complete his internship at Harbor in June and will go to the University of Colorado Medical Center to begin a three-year residency. Nurse Karen, who has been in admitting at Harbor, will join the nursing staff at the same facility. On duty, Nurse Karen fills a hypo needle, while her doctor husband checks out a glucose feeder.



#### On the Same Payroll


