Observe National Hospital Week

In observance of National Hospital Week, May 9 to 15, Torrance Memorial Hospital will hold an Open House this afternoon from 1 to 4 p.m., according to Leonard A. Ensminger, hospital ad-ministrator.

During this event, the Hospital Auxiliary will conduct tours through the hospital giving the public a chance to view hospital facilities including many of the behind-the-scene services and "off-limit" areas.

This year's national theme is "People—Heart of the Hospital." Ensminger pointed out that even though science and technology contribute remarkably to patient care, people continue to be the most important elements in the hospital.

"In some ways, today's hospitals resemble small cit-ies," stated the administrat-or. "They centralize in one

institution many of the essentials of every day life and many of the services we regularly use. They provide not only room and board, but also have a "drug store," a power plant, a library, and in many cases a "school" for professional personnel."

"One in every seven per-sons requires hospitalization each year. This means that each year. This means that every person in the community has a vested interest in the hospital and it behooves everyone to become familiar with the hospital, its services and its objectives" Ensminger advised.

"A hospital is a flexible and dynamic institution, responding and reacting to changing health needs of the community."
