Court Wins State Awards At CDA Annual Parley


Catholic Daughters of America, was presented with five state awards at the 21st Biennal State Conference held recently at the Am-bassador Hotel in Los An-geles.

Mrs. Sally Jenkins, who has made Torrance her her home since 1943 and who, for the past 15 years has been a vocational nurse at Harbor General Hospital, was honored at a surprise retirement coffee Saturday given by her daughter. Mer retirement coffee Saturday given by her daughter, Mrs. Robert Voien, and a friend Mrs. Mary Riggles. Many neighbors and friends were on hand for the event. Pediatrics has been Mrs. Jenkin's favorite ward dur-ing her years at Harbor Gen-eral.

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Hard work and children's care are not strangers to Mrs. Jenkins, whose early life involved the raising of younger brothers and sisters on a small farm near Goshen, Utah, following the early death of her mother. She pridefully remembers

her father as preacher, acting mayor and central figure in this pioneer town.

She was married to Chester W. Jenkins, who became a foreman at a large Provo Steel Plant. She then began

Steel Plant. She then began rearing her own family of seven children, later to become adviser in the rearing of her 24 grandchildren.

During World War II, she found time to teach First Aid and Home Nursing classes while she awaited news of her three sons overseas.

After moving to Torrance in 1943, she was active in PTA, painted ceramics, and saw her three youngest chil-dren graduate from Tor-rance High, attend El Ca-mino college, and her young-

est son graduate from San Jose State College.

Nearing her 50th birthday, Mrs. Jenkins for the first time sought work outside her home. She became an aide at Harbor Hospital. Two years later she was graduated with honors from one of the first vocational nursing courses. She has seen the hospital grow from converted barracks to its present multi-story structure.

With her retirement, she plans to spend time visiting her children and grandchildren in northern California, Idaho and Utah, but those who know her best say "it is likely that such busy hands and talents for service will keep her active and "on call."
