Torrance YWCA became an official member of the National Young Women's Christian Association as an affiliated unit on May 10.

Since Dec. 7, 1960, the local organization has been a pre-affiliate of the YWCA. Through the efforts of the officers and board of directors, membership obligations and requirements for national affiliation were presented in March.

Mrs. Opal Benard, past president and board member, compiled the presentation. National YWCA headquarters in New York notified the local unit of acceptance by telegram, later confirmed by letter, making the Torrance association a member of the large family of YWCA throughout the United States and the world.
