# Marilyn Goes Flying

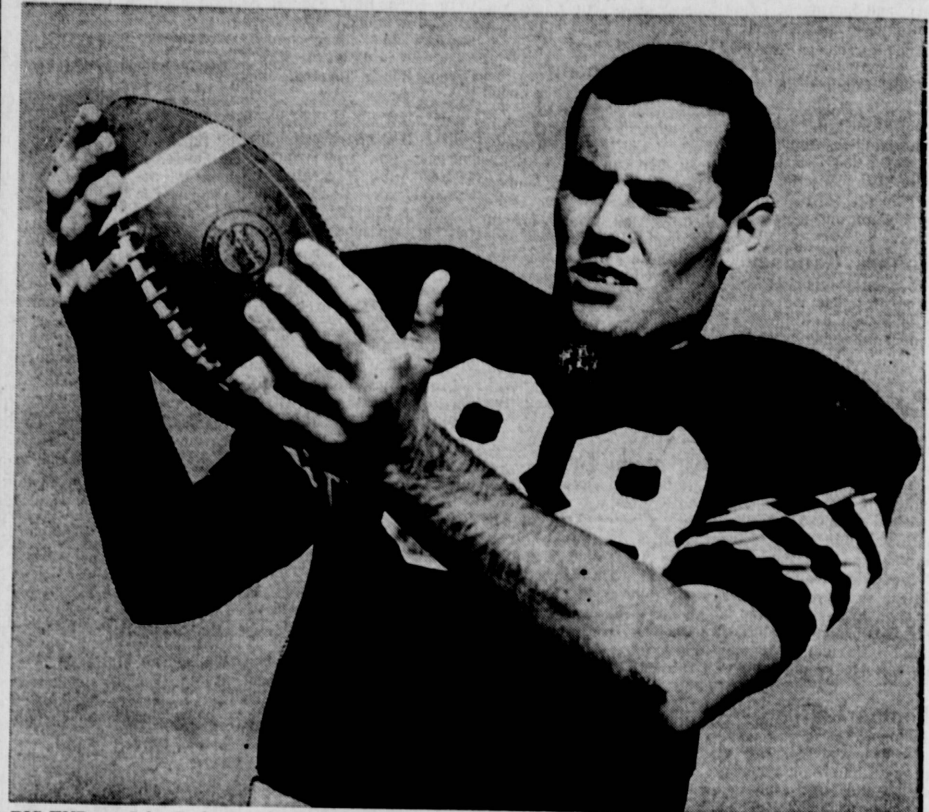
Marilyn Jensen, assistant director of recreation and parks in Torrance, has stepped up her ambitious career to include a flying license. Yesterday Marilyn joined Margaret Callaway of San Pedro, her flying instructor, in a one-day cross country San Diego Fallon Fun Race. For women only, the race was for stock airplanes of not less than 90 horsepower nor more than 400 horsepower. Margaret and Marilyn piloted the instructor's shiny silver and red Cessna 140 from Montgomery Field, San Diego, to Fallon Municipal Airport, Nevada, in a seven-hour mission. Sponsoring Mrs. Callaway's jaunt was Van der Horst Corporation of Terrell, Texas, a processor of Porus-Krone for aircraft cylinders. Mrs. Callaway, a veteran pilot, recently placed third in the Hayward to Las Vegas Air Race and last week placed second in the Henry Ohye Trophy Air Race. She has 7,300 hours and holds a commercial license, instrument rating and instructor rating. An instructor at Trojanair, Torrance, Mrs. Callaway

is married to Lt. Col. Richard Callaway, USAF retired. She has two daughters, Sandra, 24, and Margo, 23, both active pilots, flying and placing in many races. Mrs. Callaway, among her years of racing, has placed in such races as the Powder Puff Derby, International Air Race, which she won in 1957 and the San Diego to Tahoe Air Race which she won last year. Miss Jensen graduated from San Jose State College with a bachelor of arts in recreation and is now completing her master of arts at the University of Southern California.

## BASEBALL DRAFT Major Leagues Eye 826 Grads

Organized baseball's first player draft in New York earlier in the week resulted in a distribution of 826 high school, junior college and collegiate graduates to the 20 major league clubs and their farm teams.

Among those drafted from the Torrance area Monday and Tuesday were John Marsden of West High and Dick White of South High.

Marsden was named to the All-CIF "AA" team for the second straight year. He is a pitcher, first baseman and third baseman.

Dick White is an All-Bay League first baseman. First player to be selected

in the major league draft was Rick Monday, former Santa Monica High School and all-NCAA outfielder from Arizona State College.

Major league clubs have six months in which to negotiate with the draftees, after which they become free agents again if not signed.

Those elusive little grunion are all set to hold their next four-night spawning party on the sandy ocean beaches of southern California, starting tomorrow, the Department of Fish and Game reports.

Runs lasting about an hour each are expected to begin around 9:45 p.m. Tuesday, 10:45 p.m. Wednesday, and 11:30 p.m. Thursday.

The silvery smelt-like fish may be taken on the beach or in the surf by hand only, the DFG said.

There is no bag limit, but anyone 16 years old or over must have a California angling license.

## Indy-Type Race Set

The closest thing to Indianapolis-type championship racing on an oval track is next Friday night's California Racing Association sprint car program at Saugus Stadium. The sprint cars—scaled down models of Indy roadsters—are actually more powerful than their championship cousins.

The aerodynamic-bodied Pulsator, powered by two Chrysler engines which combine for 730 cubic inches of piston displacement and fantastic power output figures, has a best speed of 202.10 and best elapsed time of 7.61.

## SCHOOL'S OUT SAFETY WEEK

# Caution Required at Sea

Strict safety rules, full knowledge of boat handling and proper safety equipment should be the watchword for all boating enthusiasts, the "School's Out Safety Week" committee said this week.

Safety week is observed June 13-20, and is a public service program designed to promote proper safety during the summer vacation period when children are out of school and the family is engaging in boating, camping and traveling by car.

Recreational boating accidents last year seriously injured 1,164 persons and took the lives of 1,104, mostly by drowning. More than two-thirds of the fatalities occurred when boats capsized or passengers fell overboard.

The safety committee said three special U.S. Coast Guard studies showed lifesaving devices greatly increase chances of survival, and in their study covering 3000 persons, 86 per cent who perished lacked lifesaving equipment.

Boat owners should be familiar with the recommended mouth-to-mouth artificial respiration method and should carry a First Aid Marine kit containing a plastic resusitube for drowning emergencies.

The primary causes of serious injuries, according to the National Safety Council, are collisions, fires and explosions, accounting for more than 60 per cent of the injuries.

A list of "common sense" rules which should be observed by all who go down to the sea are:

- Provide each person with an approved life jacket or cushion.
- Don't overload your boat—one person to a seat.
- Stay with your boat if it capsizes—metal boats with good air tanks and wood boats don't sink.
- Don't smoke when refueling—always be careful with matches.

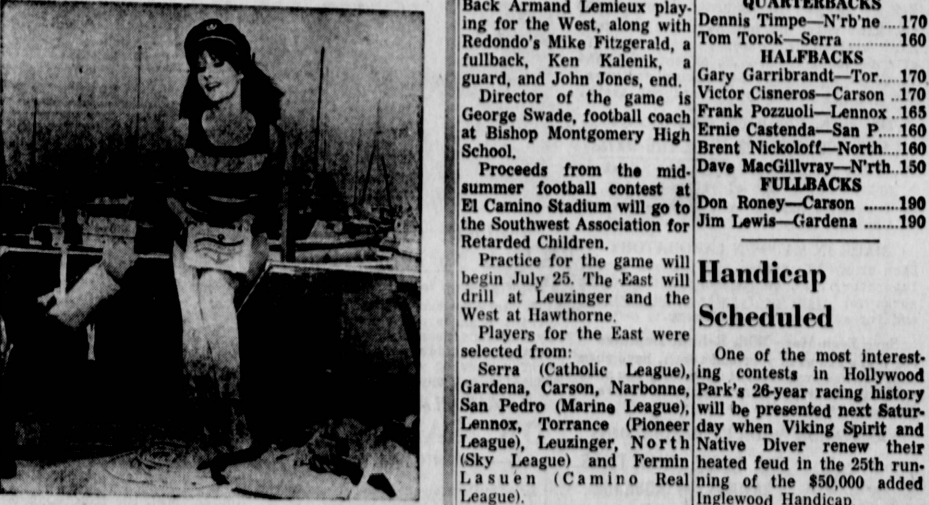
