Ranchero Days Are Here Again

This afternoon at 4 p.m., Torrance's annual Ranchero Days celebration will open its five day run at Del Amo Center, Hawthorne and Sepulveda Bl·d.

Co-sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Torrance Mounted Police, the fund-raising carnival is receiving the support of at least 17 other service clubs and churches. This year for the first time the Fiesta Shows have been booked

for the five-day run.

Money derived from the event will go to philanthropies. Booths operated by the clubs of the city will give a percentage of their profits to the float for the Tournament of Roses parade. The balance of the proceeds go to the club funds for

carrying out their civic, youth and welfare en-

Two women's groups, who will participate in the event, by manning booths are the Torrance Jaycettes and the Torrance Junior Woman's club. From 3 p.m. to 10 p.m. daily the Jaycettes will operate a six-ball roll-down concession. Mrs. James Hussey is chairman of the project assisted by Mrs. Ralph Grippo, co-chairman.

The Junior Woman's club will operate the "poodle pitch" booth, with proceeds earmarked for philanthropy. They will also take part in the parade on Saturday morning with a float "Our Cultural Heritage in American Dress." The Juniors will be dressed in early American costumes.
