Harbor Freeway

800 Calls Placed in One Month

More than 800 calls have been placed to police headquarters on the new system of Harbor Freeway emergency telephones which began operation July 1, according to Supervisor Kenneth Hahn.

An average of 25 to 30 calls from motorists needing assistance are placed daily from the phones between the Santa Monica Freeway interchange and El Segundo boulevard.

A direct line to the Southern California Automobile Club is now available to motorists using the emergency telephones.

THE LINE was established because the Los Angeles Police department has transferred approximately 125 calls to the Auto Club from members seeking assistance.

Now, when a caller identifies himself as a club member, the police switchboard can connect him directly to the Auto Club.

More than half of the calls are for tow service and roadside assistance. Many have also been received to sum-

mons assistance to traffic accidents and cars on fire.

"THIS SYSTEM is daily proving itself one of the most valuable motorists' aids since the median dividers on the freeways," Hahn said.

Both the telephones and freeway fences are the result of long campaigns by Hahn. The fences are now standard on all Los Angeles County freeways and the supervisor this week urged the expansion of the emergency telephone system to other freeways.

IN A LETTER to Gordon Hough, vice president and general manager of Pacific Telephone Co., Hahn suggested planning begin to extend the telephone system on the Harbor Freeway from Rosecrans to the San Diego Freeway intersection and on the San Diego Freeway between its interchanges with the Harbor and Santa Monica freeways.
