Many Use Vacation Weeks To Learn Improved Skills

The traditional vacation season is in full swing, but not every one is heading for the beach, the mountains, or the country to live at a snail's pace.

New business enterprises are springing up to cater to the increasing number of Americans who are actively improving their minds with study courses, or learning new skills to advance in their own profession. Summer schools and workshops are flourishing with this renewed interest in creativity and in continuing education.

Language courses, painting, photography, and woodwork are among the popular activities, but there are countless more, including personal finance, and public speaking. Many older people are studying and planning both business and recreation activities for the "sunset years." Astromony will have more followers, too, as the result of extensive and exotic space programs being carried on at the national level.

GLOW SHOWS THROUGH
A new self-shining floor wax that is said to put an "invisible raincoat" over the shine is now in national retail distribution, after what was termed the "most successful" introductory marketing effort experienced by Johnson Wax in the floor care field. "Within two months after its introduction in the Northeast, new 'Bravo' floor wax achieved unusually impressive consumer acceptance," said a spokesman.

The major features attributed to the new product—first floor wax to contain a rare element called zirconium—is that floors coated with it comes up shining after a washing with a detergent solution. Yet, the spokesman said, the finish can be re-

moved easily by adding ammonia to a washing solution. He predicted that the new wax would mean an increased over-all market for floor waxes, rather than mere brand shifting, and added that this new wax apparently had a high appeal to homemakers who had not been regular wax purchasers.

BITS O' BUSINESS—National General Corp. plans to add 100 new movie houses over the next three years, most of them in fast-growing suburbs or as drive-ins. Housing starts in June were higher than May, but still 6 percent lower than a year ago. J. C. Penney Company may negotiate for Channing Financial, a holding company with subsidiaries in life and casualty insurance, and in mutual funds. Reports are that the new Volkswagens will have slightly larger engines and higher top speeds. A fastback model may be added in a still larger edition. A nuclear-powered desalination plant to produce a million gallons of fresh water daily has been authorized for Riverhead, N.Y., on Long Island Sound; it's scheduled for 1968 completion. First underwriting of railroad common stock in more than 30 years with planned sales of 105,000 shares of Chicago & Eastern Illinois Railroad. Proceeds will be for redeeming Class A shares.

INCREASE IN DRIVERS—If you've wondered what happened to those post-war babies, the answer is that they are driving cars. And they're providing exceptional opportunities for a man who wants to set up his own business, says in industry leader. The "driving age" group (from 17 to 70) has increased an average of 1.1 million a year for more than a dec-

ade, according to W. H. Campbell, vice president of R. F. Goodrich Tire Co. Last year there was a gain of two million.

Along with more autos and more drivers, Campbell finds there are more young men with a little capital applying for franchises to set up their own tire retail businesses. To assist potential new dealers BFG will find a suitable location, negotiate a lease, design a building, and provide a major part of the capital. It also offers on-the-job training and a complete bookkeeping system, and the company assists with advertising and promotion, point-of-purchase displays, identification and literature, Campbell said.

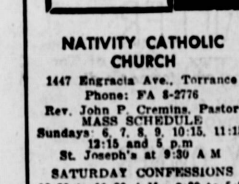
