Both young people are active in Young Democrats.

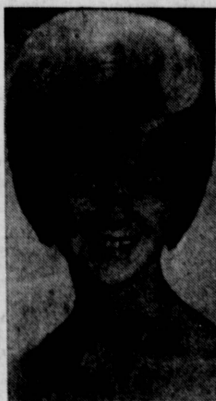
Baker - Ronnow
