

Jaycees Report Sales Lagging

Torrance residents may lose out on buying copies of the first book written on the city's history if orders for an additional 500 copies are not placed this month, according to David Nair, publicity chairman of the Torrance Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The 154-page book, "History of Torrance," first made news when it was published in 1964 by the Torrance Unified School District as a resource book for schoolteachers. Because no history of the city had ever been written,

'Jobs for Students' Drive Set

"Hire a South High Student" will become a familiar phrase throughout Torrance, according to Mrs. Robert A. Denney, president of the South High PTA, and Mrs. June Roper, manager of the Torrance office of the California State Employment Service.

During the Week of April 18 through 22, all students will be given an opportunity to register and be interviewed at the high school as part of a program designed to help students interested in finding summer work or part-time jobs.

Some 10,000 postal cards will be distributed throughout the city and surrounding area to homes, businesses, and civic organizations to promote jobs for the students. Mrs. Roger Caukin, chairman of the program, is prepared to register all 2,900 students.

APPLICATIONS and parent consent slips will be distributed in the South High administration building during lunch throughout the week. Interview times also will be assigned.

Mrs. Betty McKeown and Paul Schotanus of the Youth Employment Service will conduct the interviews.

The green cards are designed to be kept near the telephone. Mrs. Caukin explained. They will include the telephone number of the Youth Employment Service—FA 8-2611—and a list of jobs which the youths can handle.

LISTED ARE such jobs as baby sitting, dog sitting, pool sitting, pool cleaning, window washing, yard work, painting, help at teas and parties, typing, tutoring, running errands, receptionists, delivery boys, stock boys, and bus boys.

"When you get your green card, put it near your telephone," Mrs. Denney said. "When a job needs to be done, call the Youth Employment Service."

Torrance Book Fair Set April 30 at South High

The biggest book fair ever held in Torrance will take place at South High School Saturday, April 30.

An estimated 3,000 teachers, parents, and students are expected to attend the "Meet and Greet the Authors" book fair. The event is being presented by the Torrance Education Association in cooperation with the Torrance Public Libraries, the Educational Council of Torrance, and the South High PTA.

Eighteen authors and illustrators of children's books have accepted invitations to appear.

EVENTS WILL be geared to students' ages, according to Anthony Virga, book fair chairman.

Youngsters in the kindergarten through fifth grade will have an opportunity to chat informally with four authors and illustrators from 9 to 11 a.m. in

the South High cafeteria. Highlighting the program in the cafeteria will be art demonstrations by the illustrators. Students attending this event must be accompanied by parents or teachers.

Greeting the youngsters from kindergarten through fifth grade during the book chats will be: Taro Yashima, author; June Behrens, author; Jane Carlson, illustrator, and Leo Politi, author-illustrator.

THREE EVENTS are planned for students in the sixth grade through high school age group, teachers, and parents.

From 9 a.m. to 10:15 a.m., a panel program featuring 12 authors will be conducted in the gymnasium. Mrs. Kenneth Watts, president of the Torrance Board of Education, will moderate the discussion. Panelists will include authors Beverly Cleary, Miriam Cox, Rosemary DeCamp, Lorenz Graham, Marvin Laser, Jonreid Lauritzen, Margaret Leighton, Edmund Lindop, Roy Marsh, Rutherford Montgomery, Scott O'Dell, J. Kenner Agnew, Loyd Prante, and Russell McCall.

FOLLOWING the panel program, students and adults will have an opportunity to attend individual classroom lectures by each of the panelists. The classroom discussion sessions are scheduled, one from 10:30 to 11 a.m. and one from 11 to 11:30 a.m.

Due to limited classroom seating, tickets will be required for these sessions. Persons desiring to get tickets for a particular author may do so from 8 to 9 a.m. in the foyer of the gymnasium. There will be no charge. The tickets will be distributed on a first-come, first-served basis.

While discussion periods are held in classrooms, free films will be shown simultaneously in the gymnasium from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. featuring authors and books.

FINAL EVENT, scheduled from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the cafeteria, will be a meet-and-greet session featuring all the authors. At this time books by the authors will be displayed and the author will autograph books. Persons desiring to purchase books will have an opportunity to do so during the meet-and-greet session. Proceeds will be used to provide scholarships.
