# Scout-O-Rama Will Feature 600 Exhibits

Five special program areas will vie for audience attention with 600 booths at the Scout-O-Rama/66 to be presented May 21 by the Los Angeles Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, at El Camino College, according to South Bay chairman James Farrell.

Three hundred booths will feature such scout skills as axmanship, first aid and tent making, along with more exotic displays in space exploration, a driverama, and glamour panel. Cub Scouts will demonstrate their back yard games and crafts. Most of the booths will invite audience participation, such as pancake flipping, fingerprinting and nature identification.

After a tour of the booths, anyone attending the Scout-O-Rama/66 will probably want to see the little theatre productions, which include bands, magic shows and skits. After that, it's a short walk to the challenge arena where scout troops challenge each other in friendly competition. It could be anything from knot-tying to bridge-building, or even a pillow fight.

NEXT A VISIT to the pioneering area, where adventuresome scouts will build large structures such as monkey bridges and signal towers. The aqua pool might be next on the agenda, where sea scouts will demonstrate canoeing and boating techniques, water safety and put on a water carnival.

The Indian village, where

continuous demonstrations of Indian life, customs and crafts take place, is the last of the five special areas at the Scout-O-Rama/66. Indian dances will be featured, along with demonstrations in making authentic Indian costumes. A teepee village will be set up and many scout units will sleep overnight prior to the opening of the show.

Tickets to this six-in-one show are \$1 each and are on sale from Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorers. Or, you may call the scout office, DU 5-3461, and tickets will be sent to you.

All proceeds from the sale of tickets directly benefit scouting locally, especially the camping program and scout work with underprivileged youths, according to Bryan Hardwick, general chairman of the show.

FOR EACH ticket sold, the scout receives a "Scout Buck" worth 10 cents toward the purchase of official scouting equipment and uniforms; his scout troop, pack or post receives an additional 25 percent as commission, and the balance of the money after show expenses is used by the scout council to support the yearly operation of summer camp and special work with low-income families.

Hardwick urged the public to support scouting by purchasing tickets for the whole family to the Scout-O-Rama/66, and to do themselves a favor by using the tickets on May 21 at El Camino College.

## Area Students Win State Scholarships

Thirty-four Torrance area high school seniors have been selected to receive California State Scholarships, according to an announcement by Arthur S. Marmaduke, executive director of the California State Scholarship Commission.
